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

THREE HUNDRED YEARS WITH THE CORSON FAMILIES IN AMERICA—THE ORIGIN AND USE OF THE NAME CORSON BY THE CAPE MAY BRANCH OF THE

CORSON FAMILY

The progenitor of the Cape May Corson families was Carsten or Corsten Jansen. This man could write and his signature is preserved in many of the early records of Gravesend and Flatbush, Long Island. Although he seems to have signed his name more often as Carsten Jansen, on at least three occasions he used Corten or Corsten. In Liber D of Flatbush records, on page 48, he signed a deed as "Corten Jan," while his name appears in the instrument, written by the clerk, as "Caersten Jansen." This deed was dated Jan. 21, 1666. In another deed, dated Jan. 27, 1666, on page 52 of the same volume, he signed his name as "Korten Jan," while the clerk in the same record wrote it "Corsten Jansen." In 1682 the progenitor was a witness to the will of William Osborn of Gravesend, dated Feb. 10, 1682, and proved Aug. 29, 1683. The witnesses signed as "Corsten Jansen, Samuel Spicer and Peter Smith." (New York Historical Society's Abstract of Wills, V. 1, p. 469.)

That this man should sign his name sometimes as "Carsten" and on other occasions as "Corsten" is not as unusual as it might seem. Carsten, Corsten, Corst, Corstiaan, Corst, Karsten, etc., are variant forms of the same name, all being derived from the word Christ. They are all forms of the name Christian or Kristian. Carsten was used, it would seem from the records of New Netherland, as a first or baptismal name, not only by the Dutch, but also by the Scandinavians, as in the case of Carsten Jansen Eggert as is later The fact that this man used the name "Corsten" is explained. mentioned by the compiler, because it no doubt accounts for his sons using the name Corston and later Corson. "Jansen" in Corsten Jansen is not a family name, it must be remembered, but a patronymic name, designating Carsten or Corston as the child of Jan, and from this patronymic name we know that "Jan" was the first or baptismal name of Carsten's father. In the record of the will heretofore mentioned, the family names of the English

settlers, William Osborn, Samuel Spicer and Peter Smith, are quite in contrast to the name, Carsten Jansen.

The two sons, John and Peter, of Carsten Jansen, were born at about the time that the English took over control of New Netherland from the Dutch. At the time they became of age and their names began to appear in the records, the effect of the English customs, that began to prevail after the English assumed control, was being felt and the patronymic system, that had heretofore been rigidly followed by the Dutch and Scandinavian settlers in naming or designating their wives and children, was not followed in its truest form. It must be borne in mind that in England and France this patronymic system had before this period been discarded and that family names had come into common use. This was not true of the Dutch and Scandinavian countries, where, except in exceptional cases, the patronymic system was at its height, and the wives and children were designated by adding the genitive ending, "sen," "se," "s," or as it also appears in the records, "szen" or "sz," to the first or baptismal names of the father or husband. This ending designated the wife or child as belonging to, or as the wife of the husband or child of the father. The sons of Carsten Jansen did not at first use the name Corson, but this name was evolved or corrupted from the patronymic, Carstensen. The fact that Gravesend, L. I., the home of this family, was settled by the English, and that they predominated in the population, possibly hastened the changing of the name to the more English form. The Gravesend records were recorded in the English language, but still the clerks attempted to write the name in the patronymic form, although it appears as such in the English form of spelling.

The writer will show how this name was evolved into Corson from its patronymic form. This evolution is clearly shown and illustrated in the records themselves. The spelling of the various names will be given as they appear in the original records, photostatic copies of which are in possession of the compiler. The English form of Jan is John and Carsten often appears when written by the clerk as Carson, although the father of John and Peter signed his name as "Corsten" or "Carsten" Jansen. Thus the father's name when written by the clerk often appears as Carsten Johnson or Carson Johnson. In two of the earliest records in which the names of John and Peter appear, the name appears in the correct patronymic form, although the clerk in one, used the English form of Carsten and Jan and also the English form

of the genitive ending "sen," writing it "son." The record in which the name of the two brothers appear in the correct patro-nymic form is Gravesend Book VI, p. 38, by which "John Cars-tensen" conveyed parts of certain tracts to his brother "Petter Carstensen." This deed was dated Mar. 21, 1687-88. In this deed appears the English name of "Jerimyah Stillwell," which it should be noted is not written in the patronymic form. This docu-ment was signed by the mark of "John Carstensen." The other early record in which the name appears in the correct patronymic form, although spelled in the English fashion, is Gravesend Book In this deed, William Goulding, as attorney for V, p. 125. Thomas Coddington conveyed two garden spots and buildings to "John Carsonsson," and "Peeter Carsonsson." It is very clear in this instance that the name "Carsonsson" is nothing more than an English form of the patronymic, Carstensen. It designates the two sons as John, Carson's son; and Peter, Carson's son. In this deed John made his mark to "John Carssonson" and Peter signed his name as "Peter Corsonson." William Goulding made his mark to the name "William Goulding." This deed was dated May 25, 1685. It should again be noted that the English names, "Goulding" and "Coddington" are not patronymic names, but are family names, such as were already used by the English at this period.

About ten years later, the effect of the English customs was more pronounced and in three deeds the names of the two sons appear as John and Peter "Carsten," which is the patronymic name minus the genitive ending. It is the first name of the father used as a last or patronymic name of the sons. These three deeds are found in Gravesend Book VI, p. 111, dated Sept. 23, 1693; p. 136, dated Sept. 25, 1694; and p. 154, dated Jan. 10, 1695-96. Peter signed two of these deeds by dropping the genitive ending, "son," from his signature of "Corson-son," of May 25, 1685, and writing his name "Peeter Corson." Thus was the name "Corson" first used by the Cape May branch of the family. John had already gone to Cape May County and he did not so soon drop the corrupted patronymic form of Carsten or Corsten, as we find his name spelled in various Cape May records, including his will, dated Jan. 11, 1721, as "Corston." John's and Peter's names were also found in Cape May records spelled as "Causon" and "Coston," but it finally was spelled only in the English form of "Corson."

Many years later than the period we have been discussing, the patronymic system was still used to some extent by the descendants of John and Peter, although in modified form. The following interesting account of this system was given to the compiler by Mrs. Letitia Y. Corson Tomlin, of Westfield, N. J., and pertains to the time when the descendants of the family were very numerous in Upper Township, Cape May County. She wrote: "One of the most amusing things peculiar to the upper part of the county now called 'Upper Township,' where the greater part of the Corsons resided, was the way they distinguished the wives and even children, calling them by their husband's name or that of their father, to the amusement of our Philadelphia friends and relatives as well as many in the county. My grandfather would speak of Aunt Rhodie Bijie, who was none other than one Rhoda who had married Abijah Corson. In the radius of a mile in a county village there might be three or more Marys, who had married Corson men and these to be distinguished would be called by their husband's first name, Mary John or Mary Sammy, whatever the case might be."

THE NATIONALITY OF CARSTEN JANSEN

The question of nationality of Carsten Jansen, the progenitor or founder ancestor of the Cape May families is an interesting one. It is especially so in view of the fact that many authorities have presumed that all the Corson families in America were descended from one common ancestor and that the common progenitor was of French Huguenot stock. If you have been a student of Corson genealogy you will have noticed that practically every instance in which it had been claimed the family was of Huguenot ancestry, it was the descendants of Cors Pietersen, that were referred to. It seems to have been taken for granted that there was only one progenitor. Then it was discovered that Carsten Jansen was the father of John and Peter Carstensen, Corston, or Corson, of Cape May County, and following the theory that all of the name were of common stock several attempts were made to show that Cors Pietersen and Carsten Jansen were from a common ancestor. But when these claims were checked with the records, it was found that they could not be verified.

Nothing was found in the records that gave any suspicion that Cors Pietersen and Carsten Jansen were related. The history of these two men as compiled in this work from the records shows that they had little in common. In fact, all the circumstantial evidence seems to indicate that they were not even of the same nationality. You have already been shown, according to the official records of New Netherland, that Cors Pietersen came from Langeraer, Holland. In the face of the evidence, it can hardly be denied that he or his ancestors, for many generations before him, were of Dutch stock. But let us see what was found to indicate the nationality of Carsten Jansen. This man could write and we have his signature preserved not only once but several times. He signed his name as "Carsten Jansen," which is itself the most convincing proof that he was not of French ancestry. His name was a patronymic name and he chose to sign it as such in an English settlement, in which the records were recorded in English, and in which settlement patronymic names were not the rule but the exception. If he were of French or English origin he most certainly would not have used a patronymic name, and especially so since he was still using the patronymic name as a signature as

late as 1696 and 1697, thirty-three years after the English had taken over control of New Netherland and at a time the English customs already had begun to prevail and family names were coming into use.

A search of the Gravesend records was made by Mr. Frank L. Van Cleef, of the Commissioner of Records Office, Brooklyn, N. Y., in an attempt to find positive proof of nationality of Carsten Jansen, but without success. There seemed to be no reference of nationality in the records, so we will have to be guided by the circumstantial evidence. Carsten Jansen chose to locate and live in Gravesend, L. I., where the Dutch were very much in the minority. From the records of him that are preserved, it is very evident that he did not associate to any great extent with Dutch people. From this fact we certainly have a right to suspect that he was not of Dutch ancestry. From the name alone it can hardly be determined whether he was of Dutch or Scandinavian origin. It is true that "Jansen" is Dutch, but a Dane or Norwegian, known as Jensen, would in a country controlled by the Dutch be readily called "Jansen."

That the name Carsten Jansen could have been used by a Scandinavian is well established in John O. Evjen's SCANDINAVIANS IN NEW YORK, 1630-1674. Under the heading, Danish, in this volume, p. 195, appears the following: "Carsten Jansen Eggert from Dithmarschen in Schleswig-Holstein was in New Ansterdam in 1655 or before. . . ." Carsten Jansen Eggert was an entirely different person from the subject of this sketch, as his will was proved, May 9, 1678. That the baptismal name, Carsten, was used by other Scandinavians is also proved by the fact that there were several settlers in New Netherland who were called Carsten de Noorman and who, therefore, were clearly Norwegians.

The most convincing evidence that Carsten Jansen was of Scandinavian descent rather than Dutch was found in the tradition that exists among his descendants. During the gathering of data for the history of the Cape May families, the compiler came into contact with the genealogists of the family. Some of these persons had been interested enough to gather data concerning their family many years ago and to record the results of their endeavors before they passed on. Others had the foresight to discuss these questions with their parents and grandparents. It was the opinion of the majority of these persons that the family was of Scandinavian origin. The few that suggested Dutch ancestry were, in most instances, influenced by Stanley Craig's statement in his History of Petersburg, and it was his opinion that the family was of Dutch stock. Not one offered any tradition from their forefathers that they were of Huguenot stock. The opinion of some of these family historians will no doubt be interesting.

Probably the most outstanding of the early genealogists was Florence Corson Barnes, now deceased. After the death of her husband, she became greatly interested in gathering and recording data about her ancestors. She prepared two family trees, one listing the descendants of John and the other of his brother, Peter Mrs. Barnes prepared her charts after considerable Corson. research, the data being secured by interviewing the older members of the family by traveling over Cape May County with her father, with a horse and buggy. She also examined, it would seem from her records, many old wills, marriage records, etc., and has recorded the names of the wives, which were found to be very accurate. This data was gathered forty or more years ago, while some of the great great grandchildren of John and Peter Corson were still living, and who had heard their parents and grandparents talk about family ancestry. It is not at all likely that the question of ancestry would have been handed down to her incorrectly.

Mrs. Letitia Young Corson Tomlin of Westfield, N. J., is the present owner of the original Florence Corson Barnes charts, and Mrs. Tomlin was kind enough to furnish the author with photostatic copies of these charts. Concerning the nationality of the family, Mrs. Barnes had recorded the following on each of her charts: "John Corson, a Swede"; and "Peter Corson, a Swede."

Let us see what some of the other family historians say. Miss Mary Leonora Corson of 1124 Asbury Ave., Ocean City, N. J., has for many years been interested in Corson genealogy. She advised concerning ancestry as follows: "When my mother was living, she had a very clear mind and often would talk of old days and really enjoyed that much more than she did later happenings. Just where she got this from I cannot tell, but she always said the Corsons were Norwegians, that we all had the light blue eyes of the Norway people."

A letter was addressed to Miss Victoria Corson, a great granddaughter of Joseph, the first, living at Petersburg, N. J. She was ninety years old Oct. 23, 1931. Miss Victoria's eyesight did not permit her to reply and Mrs. Allen Corson, of Ocean City, answered for her. She replied that Miss Victoria Corson knows nothing definite, but Mrs. Corson adds: "I can only say that the Corsons around here seem to think that they are of Scandinavian

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descent. No one, unfortunately, knows anything and those that *knew* have passed on. There are some members of the family whose features seem to substantiate the above theory."

Mrs. Letitia Y. Corson Tomlin of Westfield, N. J., said she has always favored the Scandinavian theory. Mrs. Cara Ellen Corson Bevis, of College Hill, Cincinnati, Ohio, said she had always been told that they were of Scandinavian stock. The majority of those interviewed, who expressed themselves on the subject, seemed to think the family was of Scandinavian origin. This tradition existed among the descendants of both John and Peter Corson, and it was not confined to any particular part of the country. An interesting incident concerning the family characteristics of light hair and blue eyes of the Cape May Corsons, was related to the writer by Mrs. Eliza Jane Corson Downs, of 1501 N. Redfield St., Philadelphia. She said she attended the annual meetings of the Corson Family Association, when possible, and on one occasion at a reunion held on Alan Corson's lawn, a very bright woman, a Corson by marriage, carrying her family tree with her, walked right up to her and said: "You are a South Jersey Corson." Mrs. Downs said: "I was very much surprised and asked the lady how she knew that, as I was born and raised near Philadelphia, although my father was born at Seaville. N. J." This lady, continued Mrs. Downs, whom I did not know, said: "The South Jersey Corsons were all light or sandy complexioned, while the Pennsylvania Corsons had dark eyes and hair." On looking over the Corsons assembled that day, I found she was right, concluded Mrs. Downs.

CHARACTERISTICS OF THE CAPE MAY CORSONS —RELIGIOUS AFFILIATIONS—CHIEF OCCU-PATIONS—CIVIL AND MILITARY SERVICE

It is unfortunate that nothing was found in the records conclusively establishing the country whence Carsten Jansen, or his parents, if he was born in this country, had come. According to the widespread tradition in the family, which seems to be verified by the predominating family characteristics of blue eyes and light hair, he was a Scandinavian. But why did Carsten Jansen choose to associate with English people? Was it because he had a dislike for the Dutch, because they had displaced or taken control of South Jersey from the Swedes, or possibly had he married into an English family? Could it have been possible that Carsten Jansen had first settled in New England, and had immigrated from there to Long Island, with those settlers of Gravesend, who were of that despised sect, known as Quakers. These were some of the questions the compiler asked himself, but found no answers.

While the names of the parents of Barbara, the wife of Carsten Jansen were not identified, her name suggests English parentage. Of the wives of the two sons of Carsten and Barbara, there can be little doubt but that John or Jan married an English woman, Maria (Mary), the daughter of Elias Daws, and from the first or baptismal name of Peter's wife, Deborah, it can also be assumed that her parents were English and probably Quakers. The names of the sons and grandsons of Carsten and Barbara, Jan (John) and Peter, Andries or Andrias (Andrew), Jacob and Christian are probably more typically Scandinavian than English, but the names of the granddaughters, Hannah, Martha and Abigail, are Scripture names and certainly indicate English Quaker parentage. The names in the several following generations were names that were commonly used by the pioneer families of Cape May. Many of them were Bible names, the use of which may be traced to the religious zeal of the inhabitants. The influence of Carsten Jansen's association with the English settlers of Gravesend is very apparent.

The names of the children of the early Cape May Corson families are quite in contrast to the baptismal names used by the Staten Island branch of Corson families. In the Staten Island Corson families, the histories of which are recorded in volume one of this work, there was hardly an exception, before the Revolutionary War period, in which their children were given names other than typical Dutch names. With only one exception, in the many baptismal records found, their children were baptised in the Dutch Reformed Church and the baptisms whether in New Amsterdam, Staten Island, New Jersey or Pennsylvania, were recorded in the Dutch language.

Although only the family records of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson, and some of their children, were found in the Minutes of the Friends Monthly Meetings, it is generally assumed that the earliest religion of the Cape May families was that of the Quakers. Peter was a contributor to the building fund of the old meeting house still standing. It is generally accepted that later they became Baptists and Methodists. But no matter of what sect, they were very religious and many of them were ministers of the Gospel.

They seem to have been very clanish. This is reflected in the great many intermarriages of the various families. While in a few instances the contracting parties were first cousins, in most cases they were more distantly related. Mr. Luther Corson, son of Elva (son of Joseph III) and Martha Corson (daughter of Miles), in a letter to Dr. David B. Corson discussing family history, said: there were eighteen intermarriages in the next generation (after Joseph I), but the contracting parties were mostly distant cousins and what was very truly remarkable: "No fools, no idiots, halt, lame nor blind." This practice of intermarriage of the Corson families seems to have almost been the rule rather than the exception. It was far more common than is apparent to the reader of this work, because the collateral lines are not always given. In many cases it was the mother of the bride who was a Corson, and of course her name was not Corson, unless her father was also a Corson. One reason for the unusual number of intermarriages lies in the fact that there were a great many Corson families descended from the two brothers, John and Peter, and the greater part of these families lived in Upper Township, fiftytwo families being recorded in the 1850 census in this township. Because of these intermarriages the most unusual circumstances present themselves to those of the family tracing their lines. Many can trace their lineage through their father and mother to the same

common ancestor. There are probably few families in America whose descendants can boast of as much blood of their progenitor. Many in tracing their lines for the compiler stated that they were mostly Corson and it could not be denied.

Whaling seems to have been the chief occupation of the earliest settlers in Cape May County, in fact, according to a traditional story, John and Peter Corson, the pioneers, were with an expedition hunting whales, when they became disgusted with the drinking and carousing of those aboard and disembarked and landed in Cape May County. The earlier generations of the Corson families in Cape May County seem to have been interested in this industry, which flourished until the early part of the eighteenth century. They were lovers of the sea and good seamen, and many of the family followed this occupation. Some farmed part of the time and went to sea part of the time. Others devoted all their time to tilling of the soil and many of the family had extensive plantations.

The family was very patriotic, taking an active part in civil and military affairs. Peter Corson, the first, was probably the first office holder, having represented Cape May County in the Assembly of the Legislature of New Jersey in 1707-08. Later Parmenas Corson served in the Council (Senate) of the Legislature in 1796-97; 1797-98; 1798-99; 1801-03; and 1804-05. Amos Corson served in the Assembly in 1836-38; and in the Council in 1838-40. Alexander Corson was Director of Freeholders in 1878.

On the Board of Freeholders we find the name of Amos Corson representing Upper Township in 1827. Parmenas Corson represented Upper Township in 1829, 1830, 1831, 1833, 1834; Miles Corson, Upper, 1839; Daniel Corson, Upper, 1844; Ezra Corson, Upper, 1846; Levi Corson, Upper, 1850, 1851; Amos Corson, Upper, 1855; Sylvanus Corson, Upper Township, 1864 to 1870 inclusive and 1872; Alexander Corson, Upper, 1873 to 1897 inclusive; Henry T. Corson, Dennis Township, 1885, 1886; Youngs Corson, Ocean City, 1889; Theophilus Corson, Upper Township, 1890, 1892, 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897.

Elva Corson was sheriff of Cape May County, 1853-58. Remington Corson was sheriff, 1881-83. Among the names of postmasters of Cape May County appear the following: Luther Corson was appointed postmaster of Palermo, N. J., Sept. 30, 1878; Elenor W. Corson at Palermo, Mar. 29, 1887; Seth W. Corson, at Palermo, Oct. 17, 1893; Remington Corson, at South Seaville, Sept. 7, 1867; Baker Corson, at South Seaville, Dec. 6, 1881; Remington Corson, at South Seaville, May 11, 1889; James H.

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Corson, at Marmora, June 21, 1890; Peter Corson, at Petersburg, Apr. 14, 1856; Harrison J. Corson, at Petersburg, Aug. 3, 1885, reappointed, Oct. 13, 1893.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR RECORD

In Capt. James Willetts' second company, Cape May Battalion of Infantry, the following served as privates: Cornelius Corson, Darius Corson, David Corson, Jacob Corson, Jesse Corson, John Corson, Levi Corson, Nicholas Corson, Parmenas Corson, Rem Corson. Capt. James Willetts, Jr., the captain of the company in which the above named ten Corsons served, was the son of James Willetts, Sr., and Martha Corson. Amos Willetts, another son of James, Sr., and Martha Corson, also served in this company as a private. Jacob and Darius Corson also served at times as seamen during the war. John Corson, Jr., of the Tarkil district, old Gloucester County, served in the Gloucester County Militia. Abel Corson, of Cumberland County, enlisted as private in the Gloucester County Minute Men, Nov., 1776, in Capt. John Hollingshead's company; he was transferred to the New Jersey Continental Line, Jan. 1, 1781; he served as fifer in Captain Hendry's company, then promoted to fifer-major.

OATH OF ALLEGIANCE

Among the people of the county who took the Oath of Allegiance to the New State Government, on May 27, 1778, appears the names of the following members of the family: Rem Corson, Jesse Corson, Abner Corson, Peter Corson, and David Corson.

WAR OF 1812

In Capt. George Norton's company of volunteers, enrolled May 15, 1814, and discharged Feb. 17, 1815, we find the following descendants of John and Peter Corson: Corporal, McBride Corson. Privates: Aaron Corson, Cornelius Corson, Jr., Elijah Corson, Jacob Corson, John Corson, and Nathaniel Corson.

Following the close of the War of 1812, the "First Regiment-Cape May" was not disbanded until 1835. Among the officers of that period were the following:

Cornelius Corson, Captain, first company, commissioned May 15, 1818. Somers Corson, Lieutenant, first company, commissioned May 20, 1816. Allen Corson, Lieutenant, first company, commissioned May 15, 1818. Enos Corson, Lieutenant, fourth company, commissioned May 15, 1818. David Corson, Ensign, fourth company, commissioned May 15, 1818. Allen Corson, Captain, first company, commissioned Apr. 21, 1822. Seth Corson, Lieutenant, first company, commissioned May 21, 1822. Aaron Corson, Lieutenant, first company, commissioned May 22, 1823. Enos Corson, Captain, fourth company, commissioned Apr. 11, 1826. Ezra Corson, Lieutenant, fourth company, commissioned Apr. 11, 1826.

SECOND BATTALION

Elijah Corson, Ensign, first company, commissioned June 10, 1817.

THE HISTORY OF THE CAPE MAY OR SOUTH JERSEY CORSON FAMILIES—CARSTEN JANSEN AND HIS FAMILY

The first record of Carsten Jansen, the founder ancestor or progenitor of the Cape May, N. J., branch of the Corsons in America, occurs under date of 1656. His name appears in a list of persons who were inhabitants and probably freeholders of Gravesend, Long Island, in that year. (History of Long Island by Benjamin Thompson, V. 2, p. 177.) Other names in the list include Wm. Goulding, John Enams, Nicholas Stillwell, Samuel, Jacob, and Thomas Spicer. It will be seen that the names of these persons are found associated in the records with Carsten Jansen and his descendants, not only in Gravesend, but the same surnames occur very often in later generations in Cape May County.

The next year Carsten Jansen again appears in the Gravesend records, in Book 3, p. 4, of Town Records, as having ten morgans in tillage in the year 1657. A morgan is equivalent to two acres. It is very likely that Carsten was in America before 1656, but a search of the records failed to establish proof. The record that lends weight to this supposition is found in Flatbush Records, No. 1006, pp. 246-247. It is here recorded that the mother of "Karsten Jansen" was buried on Nov. 5, 1665. On Dec. 23, 1665, 20 guldens were paid therefore. Because it seems his mother was in this country, is ample reason to suspect that Carsten may have been born in America, as it is not so likely that an emigrant to a new country would bring his mother with him. It seems that it would be more probable that his parents had come to this country. But as the records examined by the compiler failed to establish this fact it was necessary to call Carsten Jansen the progenitor.

On Jan. 21, 1666, Carsten Jansen bought a farm of Dirck Jansen De Groot, a cooper, on the south side of the farm of Arent Mosenaer, in Flatbush, L. I., as recorded in Liber D, p. 47 of Flatbush Records. On the next day, Jan. 22, 1666, Carsten Jansen sold a house and lot in Flatbush to Jan Jansen Fyn, as per p. 51 of Liber D of Flatbush Records. Carsten Jansen, between 1663 and 1670, appears in various suits and in 1671 he was given a release from all claims, by Bartholamew Aplegate, Gravesend

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Book III, p. 27. Between 1672 and 1695 he was allotted plots of woodland or meadow or was assessed for the construction of common fences. He appears as a witness in 1685 and 1686, in Gravesend Book V, pp. 143, 147, 151, and 157. He bought a house and lot of Samuel Spicer in 1686, Gravesend Book V, p. 159, which he afterward sold to Jacobus Enams in 1697, Gravesend Book V, p. 193. The bond he gave for this purpose is found in Paper 217. Carsten Jansen also appears as a witness to the wills of Derck Stoffels and Joanna Havens, in 1690-91. On Feb. 10, 1682, he with Samuel Spicer and Peter Smith witnessed the will of Wm. Osburn of Gravesend. (New York Historical Society Wills, Vol. 1, p. 469.)

It may be not without interest to know something about Gravesend and Flatbush. Gravesend, now a part of New York City, was established by Lady Deborah Moody, an English woman, and her associates in 1643-45. They fled from persecution in Massachusetts, and later became Quakers. It "is the most southerly part of Kings County, and includes, within its limits, Coney Island, bordering on the Ocean. It is centrally distant about ten miles from New York City, and is bounded east by Flatbush, south by the Atlantic Ocean and west by New Utrecht, being of a triangular shape, with its base resting on the Ocean and terminating in a point adjoining the town of Flatbush. The town, being an exception to the other parts of the county, was settled by English people, some of whom were of that despised sect called Quakers, most of them coming from the Colony of Massachusetts, where they had resided for different periods." (Thompson's History of Long Island, V. 2, p. 168.)

The Gravesend records were recorded in the English language, which accounts for Carsten Jansen's name being sometimes written by the English clerk as Carson Johnson. While not much is known about Carsten, it is safe to assume that he was a farmer. He seems to have bought and sold considerable property and was doubtless a man of means. He signed his name "Carsten Jansen."

Carsten Jansen married Barbara — . The name of his wife was established by the conveyance record under date of Aug. 23, 1697, and heretofore mentioned as recorded in Gravesend Book V, p. 193, a photostatic copy of this deed being in the possession of the compiler. She made her mark to this document. Carsten Jansen and his wife, Barbara, had at least two sons:

(1) JAN OF JOHN CARSTENSEN;

(2) PETER CARSTENSEN.

The name of the sons appears in the records, on at least one occasion, in the correct patronymic form of "Carstensen," it also appears in the mispelled patronymic form of "Carsonson" and "Corsonson." Then we find the patronymic name minus the genitive ending, as "Carsten" or "Corston." Later it appears as "Coston" and "Causon." Peter could write and he seems to have been the first son to use the final English form of "Corson," by which name the descendants of Carsten Jansen were later known. The origin of the name is more fully explained in chapter I, p. 3.

The baptismal or birth records of the sons, John and Peter, were not found, but Peter is positively identified as Carsten Jansen's son in a conveyance record, under date of Jan. 10, 1695-6, recorded in Gravesend Book VI, p. 154, in which it is recorded that Carsten Jansen, as attorney of his son, Peter, sold two lots of meadows in Gravesend to John Lake. The first part of this deed reads as follows:

"These Present Writting witnesseth that I Carsten Johnson Living in towne of Gravesend in Kings County on the Island Nassou in the province New York Doe hereby Absolutly own & acknowledge to have Sold Assigned and Transported by vertue of a power Given to me from my son Peter Carsten two Lotts of Medow Lying and being in ye Limits of Gravesend aforesd, viz: . . ."

Then follows a description of the lots, after which the consideration is given as three pounds, two shillings and six pence. This deed bears the signature of "Carsten Jansen" and the mark of John Lake.

That John and Peter Carstensen, Carsten or Corson were brothers is fully established by the conveyance records of Gravesend, photostatic copies of which are in possession of the compiler. These will be discussed subsequently. Although the baptismal or birth dates of the two sons were not found, it is the opinion of the compiler that they were born not later than 1665 and probably in the period ten years previous to this date. John and Peter were no doubt of age in 1685, as in that year a conveyance record is found in Gravesend Book V, p. 125, in which it is recorded that one William Goulding, of Gravesend, as attorney for Thomas Coddington, conveyed "Twoe Guarden Spotts of land with ye houseing there uppon — unto John Carsonsson and Peeter Carssonsson of ye same place their heirs Executors Administratours Assigns," etc., "And in Consideration of ye above houseing & land ye said John Carsonsson & Peeter Carsonsson are to pay unto ye sd Thomas Coddington or his order, ye summ of fifteene hundred gillders in currant passable Silver money in this Country." This document is dated the 25th day of May, 1685, and is signed by "William Goulding" and "John Carsonsson" by their marks and by the signature of "Peter Corsonson." This is the earliest conveyance record found of John and Peter Carstensen or Corson. They were no doubt of age at this time and evidently much attached to each other, as what seems to have been their first investment was made jointly. It will be seen that this same evidence of attachment to each other followed these two brothers during their whole life.

JOHN AND PETER CORSON AND THEIR FAMI-LIES—PROOF OF IMMIGRATION FROM GRAVESEND, L. I., TO CAPE MAY COUNTY, NEW JERSEY

John Corson, it seems, was the eldest son of Carsten Jansen and Barbara, and was born probably not later than 1660, as he had married Maria Eliase Daas or Daws about 1680. He baptised a son, Andries, under date of Jan. 23, 1681. This baptism is found in the records of the Flatbush Dutch Reformed Church; the parents were recorded as "Jan Karsten" and "Maria Elias Daas" and the witnesses were Elias Daas (Daws) and Barbara Karsten. Barbara Karsten (patronymic name meaning Carsten's Barbara) was the paternal grandmother, and Elias Daas or Daws was the maternal grandfather of the child, Andries. Elias Daws was alloted a plot on the Neck meadows of Gravesend in 1672. He had four daughters, Maria, Rebecca, Patience and Annetje. (Bergen p. 85.) In the baptismal record it will be noticed that the maiden name of the wife was used as was customary in the records of the Dutch Reformed Church. Jan or John Carsten or Corson's wife's name also appears in the records as Mary Jansen and Mary Johnson, in which cases the genitive ending "sen" was added to the first name of her husband, Jan or John, instead of to the name of her father.

Peter Carstensen, Carsten, or Corson married Deborah ———. Her parents' name or the probable date of her marriage to Peter was not found in the records. She was identified by the conveyance record found in Gravesend Book VI, p. 111, under date of Sept. 23, 1693, to which she made her mark to her signature written by the clerk as "Deborah (X) ye wife of Peter Carsten." Peter, no doubt, married Deborah about the same time that John married (about 1680), as their daughter was a widow with five small children in 1709.

An examination of the conveyance records of Gravesend seems to indicate that John Carsten or Corson moved to Cape May County, N. J., before his brother, Peter. John did not long keep the tracts of land that he had bought from Wm. Coddington and others. On the 21st of Mar., 1687-8, he conveyed a half interest in five tracts of land to his brother, Peter. This deed recites as follows:

"Know all men by these presents That I John Carstensen, Living at Gravesend in ye Kings County upon Long Island doe hereby owne & Acknowledge absolutely to have Sould Assigned & made over these following half portions or parcels of Land & meddouse." After a description of the five tracts it continues: "I the above said John Carstensen doe owne & Acknowledge absolutely to have Sould Assigned & made over from me my heyres Executors Administratours or Assignes for ever Unto my brother Petter Carstensen in the same Towne above sd. ——" etc.

This deed was signed by John Carstensen by his mark. It was no doubt shortly after this time that John Carstensen immigrated to Cape May County, N. J., as he is recorded as a witness in an action in slander and defamation before Burlington Court and offered testimony on June 3-4, 1690. (Steven's Hist. Cape May County, p. 33.)

That Peter Corson was still living in Gravesend on Sept. 23, 1693, and had moved to Cape May County, N. J., during the following year is shown by two conveyance records by which he disposed of his property in Gravesend. The first found in Gravesend Book VI, p. 111, and dated Sept. 23, 1693, begins by reciting as follows:

"This present writting wittnesseth thatt I Petter Carsten living att gravesend in Kings County on Long Island in ye province of New York doe hereby ——" etc.

It was to this same deed that his wife signed with her mark as "Deborah Carsten." The second deed by which Peter Corson conveyed two allotments of his Gravesend property to Cornelis Williamsen and Dirck Brower establishes clearly that Peter now lived in Cape May County, N. J., and is the record that proves that the John and Peter Corston or Corson of early Cape May history were the John and Peter Carstensen, Carsten, or Corson of Gravesend, Long Island. This deed is dated Sept. 25, 1694, and is recorded in Gravesend Book VI, p. 136. It begins by reciting as follows:

"Know all men by these presents thatt I Peeter Carsten living now in the County of Cape May in ye province of West Jersey doe hereby Absolutely Acknowledge to have sold and transported all my right and Title in two allotments of Land Lying and being in the limitts and bounds of Gravesend upon Gisberts Island so called and from my Heyers Executorss Administratours and Assignes which sd. Lotts of Land Received from William Goulding living then in this towne of Gravesend and Sould by him to us: viz to me Petter Carsten and John Carsten my brother which said lotts are of the No. 8 and No. 12 as the Record of ye towne make appears ——" etc. This deed was signed by "Peeter Corson."

The traditional story concerning the manner in which John and Peter Corston or Corson happened to settle in Cape May County is interesting and may be correct. In the latter part of the seventeenth century the whaling industry flourished off the coast of New Jersey. It is said that John and Peter Corson during the winter months engaged in the hunting of this largest of the mammalia and that during one of these expeditions the crew of the whaling ship reveled to such an extent that the two brothers became disgusted with the drinking and carousing aboard the ship and in their own language "could not stand such goings on." They therefore embarked in a yawl boat, when off the coast of New Jersey and landed in Cape May County. They are said to have spent their first winter in a cave along a creek, and in the spring when the waters became high they had to move to another celler or cave on higher land. The name of this creek was thereafter Celler Creek, it being so called today and the first home in the cave was on what is now known as the Ezra Corson farm. If the traditional story is correct it is evident that Peter must have returned to Gravesend for several years before he finally disposed of his Gravesend property and came to Cape May County to join his brother John.

THE FIRST DEEDS FROM THE WEST JERSEY SOCIETY TO JOHN AND PETER CORSON

The two brothers, John and Peter Corston or Corson, bought land in 1695 of Dr. Daniel Coxe, who had obtained a grant of 95,000 acres in Cape May County and vicinity. Doctor Coxe was one of the most eminent physicians in his day, being physician to Charles II and afterwards to Queen Anne of England. Doctor Coxe formed the West Jersey Society in 1692, and in 1694 this Society began to grant deeds to the settlers who purchased land. On the 23rd of Apr., 1695, the two brothers, John and Peter Corson, again purchased land. On that day they made their first purchase of land in New Jersey, John being deeded 300 acres and Peter, 400 acres, from the West Jersey Society. My cousin, Alan Corson, of Philadelphia, presented the compiler in June, 1931, with photographic copies of these original deeds. The originals at that time were in the possession of Miss Sarah Corson of Petersburg. These two deeds are very similar in form and are very interesting. A copy of the deed to John follows:

"This Indenture Made the twenty-third day of April in the yeare of our Lord according to English Acct one thousand six hundred ninty & five Between Jeremiah Basse now of Burlington in the province of west new Jersey Merchant (Agent for the Hon. the west new Jersey society in England of the one part) and John Causon of Cape May in the Province aforsd Yeoman of the other part witnesseth that the said Jeremiah Basse According to the Power & Authority to him Given by his Commission of Agency together with the instructions and Advice from the said society thereto relating (which Commission of Agency & Instructions Advices thereto relating stand severally upon Record in Published Records of sd Province of west Jersey in Liber B. folio 301 & folio 423) for & in Consideration of the sume of thirty pounds of Currt Money within the sd province of west Jersey to him the said Jeremiah Basse by the said John Causon for & on behalfe of the society aforesd in hand payd or secured to be payd at & before the sealing and delivery hereof the receipt whereof of the sd Jeremiah Basse Doth hereby acknowledge & thereof & of every part & parcell thereof in the name & on behalf of the society aforsd Doth Acquitt Exonerate Release & Discharge the sd John Causon his heirs Executors & Administrators & Every of them forever by these presents Hath Granted bargained & sold Alyened enfeoffed & Confirmed And by these presents in the name & on the behalfe of the sd society doth fully Clearly & absolutely bargain & sell alyen Enfeoffe & Confirm unto the said John Causon his heirs And Assignes forever three hundred Acres of land taken up & surveyed forth of the Tract or Tracts of Land belonging to the aforesd society at Cape May aforesd to & for the said John Causon according to the survey thereof Returned (The Buttinge & Boundinge whereof stand recorded in the secretaryes office for the said province at Burlington aforsd Together Also with all & Every the Mines Mineralls woods ways waters ffishing fowling Hawking Hunting & all other profitts Comodities Hereditant & Appertenant to the sd Granted three hundred acres of land belonging or in any wise Appertaining & all the Estate Right Title Interests Use Trust possession property Claims & Demands whatsoever as well as the society aforesd as of the said Jeremiah Basse as their Agent as aforesd or either or any of them as in Law or in Equity of in or unto the sd granted & bargained premises or any part parcell thereof and the reversion & reversions Remain & Remainder of the same & of every part thereof TO HOLD & TO HAVE the said three hundred Acres of Land and granted & bargained premises with the Appertenances unto the sd John Causon his heirs & Assignes for Ever to the onely proper use & beheofe of him the sd John Causon his heirs & Assignes for Ever more And the sd Jeremiah Basse for himself & for & on behalfe of the said west Jersey society & in their Names & for their successors Doth promise grant & Agree to & with the said John Causon his Heirs & Assignes by these presents that the sd Jeremiah Basse or the society aforesd or either or any of them have not or hath not wittingly or willingly Committed or Done any Act Matter of thing whatsoever whereby or by Reason whereof the said granted & bargained premises or any part of parcell thereof is or may or shall be Charged burthoned or incumbred in any Tytle Charge Estate or otherwise howsoever And the said John Causon shall or Lawfully May for Ever hereafter (under the quitrent of two fat Capons or hens payable on the twenty-fourth Day of December yearly forever to the sd society their heirs or successors Agent or Attorney att Cox Hall on Cape May have hold

occupy Enjoy & possess the sd Granted & bargained premises with the & Every of the appertenances without the Lawfull Loss Mollestation Interuption or Disturbance of the sd society or Any other person or persons whatsoever) other than the quitrents thereof to the sovereigns Lord & Lady the King & Queen & their heirs & the orders thereof if Any be And further that the sd Jeremiah Basse Agent as aforesd & the sd society or their successors Agents ffactes & Attorneys or some of them & will at all & Every time & times hereafter Duering the space & term of seven years next ensueing the Date hereof at the Reasonable Request Cost & Charge of the said John Causon his heirs or Assignes Make Doe Execute or Cause or provide to be Made Done & Executed such further & other Lawful Act or Acts Matter or things for the further More full & perfect Conveying Confirming & Assuering the sd Granted Premises & Every part & Parcell thereof with the Appertenances to ye sd John Causon his heirs & Assignes forever according to the tenour true intent & Meaning of these presents soe as the person or persons to whom such request shall be Made shall not be compelable or compeled to travel or goe from the place of his or their aboad for the Making Doeing or Executing thereof And soe as such further assurances contain noe further covenants or warranty then as herein is Expressed In Witness whereof the sd Jeremiah Basse in the Name & on behalfe of the society aforesd to this present Indenture hath sett his hand & seale the Day & year first above written

(Signed) JEREMIAH BASSE

The deed from the West Jersey Society, Proprietors, to Peter Corson is similar in form and conveys 400 acres for a consideration of 40 pounds. This land is said to be located where the Seaville Station on the Reading Railroad now stands. In this deed the grantee is named as "Peter Causon Weaver." In June, 1931, the compiler visited Cape May Court House, the county seat of Cape May County, and Trenton, N. J., but failed to find either of these two deeds on record. Neither were they found at Mount Holly, the county seat of Burlington County. On Dec. 30, 1719, Peter Corson again purchased land from the West Jersey Society, the deed in this instance conveyed 208 acres for a consideration of $\pm 30.3.3\frac{1}{2}$, and was proved Oct. 2, 1721. This tract is described in the deed as "Lying & being near Egg Harbor, between the said Peter Corson's land where he now dwells and the land belonging to Peter Golder, Jr., and not joining either of them."

Less than four years before his death, Peter Corson acquired more land from the Society as the abstract of the following deed bears witness: Proprietors to Peter Corson, Senior, of Cape May County, yeoman, dated Oct. 23, 1727, recorded Nov. 22, 1727, for land beginning at the northwest corner of Peter Corson Jr.'s land and extending along Peter Corson Sr.'s and Peter Corson Jr.'s land. Also a tract of land back of John Corson beginning at Peter Corson Sr.'s northernmost corner. Also marsh land adjoining

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Christian Corson and James Hathorn beginning at Christian Corson's N.W. corner and running along James Hathorn and Jacob Corson's creek. The three tracts contained 83 acres. (Liber D, p. 294, Trenton.) Another deed, recorded in Liber D, p. 118, in the Secretary of State's Office in Trenton, dated Nov. 4, 1725, conveyed 54 acres and 148 perches of land from the Proprietors of West Jersey to Peter Corson of Cape May County.

John Corson also seems to have made purchases of land from the society, other than that recorded in the deed of 1695, although no record of the conveyances from the Proprietors to John was found. This second purchase was referred to in a deed on record in Cape May Court House, in Liber of Deeds B, p. 185, by which "John Cossons, yeoman," conveyed 200 acres of land to "Andrew Cossons" for a consideration of 40 pounds. This instrument was dated June 19, 1719, and recorded on Apr. 24, 1724. The description of the land contained the following reference to a second purchase of land from the society by John Corson: "For Messuage & tract of land in Cape May-being 200 Acres of land and marsh of that 250 acres, which was surveyed by Timothy Brandneth, Feb. 22, 1713-14, for me for ye which I have a deed from Coll. Lewis Moris, Agent for the Honorable Jersey Society." The deed was signed by John Corson and his wife, Mary Corson, by their marks. It was witnessed by John Corson, Jr., and Jacob Corson. On Nov. 21, 1720, "John Coston Junior" appeared before John Townsend, Justice of the Peace, and acknowledged "that he seen ye above mentioned instrument to be the voluntary act of the signor John Coston Senior."

Very little concerning the life of John Corston, Coston, or Corson has been preserved in the records. As we can judge him from the records, he was, no doubt, a farmer by occupation and a man of considerable means. He was commonly referred to as yeoman. John and his wife, Maria or Mary (Daws) Corson had three sons and two daughters. The baptismal or birth records of his children, except for Andrew, who, possibly, was the eldest, were not found, but their identity is well established by the will of John Corson, Sr., dated Jan. 11, 1721, proved July 31, 1728, and recorded in Liber 2, of Wills, Folio 534, Trenton, N. J. John Corston or Corson no doubt died just previous to the latter date. The children named in this will were sons: Andrew; John Jr; and Jacob; the daughters: Hannah and Martha. This will, the first made and recorded by the Cape May Corson families, is beautifully written and deserves to be reproduced in this volume in its entirety. It follows:

WILL OF JOHN CORSTON OR CORSON

"In the Name of God Amen this eleventh Day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & twenty one I John Corston of the County of Cape May in the Province of New Jersey Yeoman being of perfect mind & memory as well as health of body Thanks be given to Almighty God calling to mind the Mortality of my body & the uncertainty of this Transitory life Do make & ordain this my Last Will & Testament that is to say principaly & first of all I Recommend my Soul into ye hands of God who gave it hoping through ye Meritorious Death & Mediation of Jesus Christ my only Redeemer to Receive forgiveness of all my Sins & my Body I Recommend to the Earth to be buryed in Decent Christian Burial at the Discretion of my Executors nothing Doubting but at ye General Resurrection I shall receive ye same again by the Mighty Power of God, and Touching Such Worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to Bless me in this Life I give & dispose of the same in ye following manner & form

Imprimis I give & bequeath unto my Son Andrew the Sum of two pounds Item I Give and Bequeath unto my Daughter Hannah the Sum of Three pounds Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Martha the sum of three pounds Item I give & bequeath unto my wife Mary Corston after my Debts & the above Legacies are paid one halfe of my Personal Estate during her widowhood & incause She continues so after her Decease She may Dispose of it as she will among my Children but if she marries again She shall Carry away but one Third of my Moveables to Dispose of at her Discretion the other part to be Divided between my Two Sons Jacob & John

Item ye other halfe of my Moveables I give & bequeath two Thirds of them unto my Son Jacob & his heirs & unto my Son John I give & bequeath one Third of the said halfe of my Moveable Estate & to his heirs forever Item I constitute make & ordain my wife Mary Corston and my Son Jacob Corston my Sole Executors of this my Last Will & Testament & I do hereby Disanull Revoake & make Void all other Wills & Testaments Legacies Bequests & Executors by me in any Ways named Willed or bequeathed Ratifying & Confirming this & no other as my Last Will & Testament

In Witness whereof I have hereunto Sett my hand & Seal the Day & Year first Above written

(Signed) JOHN CORSTON X His Mark

Signed Sealed & published pronounced & Declared by the said John Corston as his last will & Testament in presence of us the Subscribers

> Peter Corson David Gandy Nathaniel Jenkins

(The copy of the above will was made for the compiler by Mr. Dayton T. Corson of Paulsboro, N. J. In the abstract of this will given in the New Jersey Archives, the children were named as Andrew, Jacob, Martha and Hannah. The name of John Corson Jr. does not appear, although his name appears twice in the original record. This is only one of the many instances in which it was found that only copies of original records can be depended upon. This error in the New Jersey Archives may have been responsible for the misplacing of John Corson, Jr., and his descendants on Champion Corson's and Florence Corson Barnes' "trees" of the descendants of John and Peter Corson.)

It should be noted that John Corston conveyed only personal property in his will. His real property, it seems, was conveyed by deed to his sons before he made his will and recorded after his death.

Peter Corson, the younger brother, was a resident of Gravesend on Sept. 23, 1693 (Gd. Bk. VI, p. 111), but had moved to Cape May County before Apr. 28, 1694, as on that date his ear mark for cattle was recorded in Cape May County, under the name of "Peter Coston." He was a member of the Legislature in 1707-08, being the second one to represent Cape May County in the Assembly after the first record in 1702. The children of Peter Corson and his wife, Deborah, whom he had married in Gravesend, L. I., were sons, Christian and Peter, Jr., and daughters, Abigail and Mary. The sons were identified by three conveyance records in the Office of the Secretary of State, in Trenton, N. J., and the daughter by the will of her husband, Shamger Hand, Jr.

The first of these three conveyance records is a deed, dated Dec. 30, 1719, and recorded Oct. 2, 1721, by which the West Jersey Society conveyed 100 acres to Christian Corson, yeoman, of Cape May County, for a consideration of 18 pounds. The description of this land recites :

"Beginning at a stake being in the South West Corner of the Tract of land and marsh belonging to Peter Corson, father to said Christian Corson, called Dry swamp and running from the said stake 80 perches to the upland and North West Half West 240 perches to a Pine tree marked with 12 notches then South West Half South $52\frac{1}{2}$ perches then South East Half East 320 perches then North East half north $52\frac{1}{2}$ perches to the beginning containing with 5 acres allowance for Highways 100 acres." (Liber BB, p. 457.)

The second conveyance record was dated June 8, 1726, endorsed the same day and recorded Nov. 5, 1733. By this deed Peter Corson, Jr., is identified as the son of Peter Corson, Sr. This instrument begins by reciting as follows:

"To all Christian People, to whom these presents shall have come, Greeting: Know ye that I Peter Corson Sr. of the County of Cape May in the province of West New Jersey yeoman for and in consideration of love good will and affection which I have and do bear towards my *loving son Peter* Corson of the same place and Province afores'd husbandman, and also for the consideration of 60 pounds good & lawful money of America, to me in hand paid. . . ." After a description of the first tract it was said to contain 208 acres with 10 acres allowance for highways. The second was described as containing 94 acres with 4 acres allowance for highways, "which second tract of land and marsh the aforesaid Peter Corson Sr. has purchased of Louis Morris, Esq. agent of the West New Jersey Society." (Liber K, p. 133.)

The third deed recorded the conveying of 4 tracts by Peter Corson, Weaver, to Peter Corson, Jr., and in the description the names of the two sons, Christian and Peter Corson, Jr., are found. This deed was dated Feb. 11, 1729, recorded Nov. 5, 1733, and the consideration 25 pounds. In the description of the first tract it is stated:

"Beginning at a stake standing in the marsh which is Christian Corson's stake in the marsh and so running up the said Christian Corson's line North West 325 perches to the said Christian's Corner in the woods & from thence N.E. 85 perches to a corner tree, which is Peter Corson Junior's own corner and then down the said Peter Corson Jr's own line South East 1 quarter South 320 perches to the said Peter Corson Jr's corner stake in the marsh and from thence South West 71 perches and 1 quarter to the place of beginning. . . ."

The first tract contained 154 acres, the second 47 acres, the third $41\frac{1}{2}$ acres, and the fourth 38 acres. This deed was signed by "Peter Corson." Witnesses were John Goff and Henry Young. (Liber K, p. 130.)

It is very evident that the father, Peter Corson, Sr., and his two sons, Christian and Peter, Jr., lived on adjoining farms. Peter Corson, Sr., died, probably in the early spring of 1731, as an inventory of his estate was dated Apr. 25, 1731. The inventory included the bonds of Peter Corson, Jr., and Christian Corson. On Apr. 29, 1731, Deborah Corson qualified as administrator, the fellow bondsman being recorded as Peter Corson and Jacob Cor-The witnesses were Henry Young and Mary Corson. It son. should be noted that the two deeds, one dated June 8, 1726, and the other, Feb. 11, 1729, by which Peter Corson, Sr., conveyed 5821/2 acres of land to Peter, Jr., were not recorded until two years after the decease of the elder Peter, both deeds being recorded on Nov. 5, 1733. It would seem that although Peter Corson, Sr., left no will, he evidently arranged before his death that the younger brother, Peter, Jr., should have the share of his father's estate that the father so desired.

The records that identify Abigail and Mary as the daughters of Peter and Deborah will be given subsequently in the history of the third generation. In order that the descendants of Peter and Deborah Corson can be readily traced from generation to generation, the order of birth of their children is used as their index number. They are indexed numerically as follows:

- 21 CHRISTIAN CORSON;
- 22 ABIGAIL CORSON;
- 23 MARY CORSON;
- 24 PETER CORSON, JR.

As no dates of birth were found, this order of birth was assumed as being the most likely arrangement.

THE THIRD GENERATION

THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN AND MARY (DAWS) CORSON

For the purpose of indexing numerically, the children of John and Mary (Daws) Corson will be listed in the following order, which probably is not much out of place: 11 Andrew; 12 Jacob; 13 Hannah; 14 John, Jr.; and 15 Martha.

11 ANDREW CORSON, the eldest son of John and Mary (Daws) Corson, was baptised Jan. 23, 1681, in the Flatbush, L. I., Dutch Reformed Church. Except for the deed of June 19, 1719, mentioned heretofore, by which John Corson, Sr., conveyed 200 acres of land to Andrew, little was found in the records concerning the eldest son. As none of the early records of the family seem to record any descendants of Andrew, it is very unlikely that he was survived by issue.

12 JACOB CORSON was probably the second child of John and Mary Corson. Concerning him, Florence Corson Barnes noted on her chart that his father conveyed the original tract of 300 acres, purchased from the West Jersey Society, in 1695, to Jacob and that the deed was recorded on Nov. 5, 1731. A record of this deed was not found at Cape May Court House or at Trenton, but as the original tract seems to have been in Jacob's possession, this transfer was probably made. Jacob married Naomi -----, whose maiden name was not learned. Naomi was also referred to as Amy, which seems to have been an abbreviated form or nickname for Naomi. Jacob died between Dec. 12, 1736, the date that he made his will, and Apr. 25, 1737, the date it was proved. In this will he was referred to as "yeoman" and his residence was given as Cape May County. He disposed of his property as follows: The place that he lived on, he bequeathed to his wife, Amy, as long as she remained his widow. In case of marriage it was to descend to his sons, Jacob and Peter. To his son, Jeremiah, he bequeathed 100 acres at the place called Fast Landing. Daughter Rachel Corson, seven pounds, when 18; daughter Amy Corson, seven pounds when 18; daughter Martha Corson, seven pounds when 18; also some cattle were given to the

daughters. The rest of his goods and chattels was given to his wife, Amy. She and his son, Jacob, were named as executors. The witnesses were John Willets, Joseph Badcock and Richard Hoe. John Willets was the husband of Martha Corson, a sister of the deceased. (Will recorded, Liber 4, p. 103, Trenton, N. J.)

It can hardly be denied that Jacob died when not a very old man, as his son, Jacob, lived 66 years after his father's decease. His wife, Amy, who was named Naomi, in the letter testamentary, probably survived Jacob, Sr., about twenty years, as it seems that the land given to her in the will was divided by the sons, Jacob and Peter, on Oct. 16, 1756. It also would seem that her sons, Jacob and Peter, lived with her until her death as Peter married in 1757, and Jacob not many years previously, probably about the time the land was partitioned. The children of Jacob and Naomi (Amy) Corson, identified in his will, are indexed as follows:

121 JACOB CORSON, II;

122 PETER CORSON;

- 123 JEREMIAH CORSON, who died intestate in 1776, and who seemed to die without issue;
- 124 RACHEL CORSON;
- 125 Amy Corson;
- 126 MARTHA CORSON.

13 HANNAH CORSON, probably the eldest daughter of John and Mary Corson, as far as could be learned did not marry.

14 JOHN CORSON, JR., or II, was probably the youngest son of John and Mary (Daws) Corson. The date of his birth was not found, but as he is mentioned as receiving payment for a debt, on Oct. 20, 1715, in the settlement of the estate of Abraham Hand, it is likely that he was of age at that time. As stated heretofore, he witnessed the deed, dated June 19, 1719, whereby John Corson, Sr., conveyed 200 acres to his son, Andrew. He died prior to Apr. 4, 1739, on which date an inventory was returned, in the settlement of his estate, by Henry Young and John Willets. Susannah Corson, who, without much doubt, was his wife, was made administratrix on Mar. 31, 1740. According to the marriage, recorded on page 761/2, Marriage Book, Years 1727-34, she married James Conaway for a second husband. The record of this marriage license follows: "James Conaway to Susannah Corson, widow, Cape May, May 14, 1741." John II and Susannah Corson had two sons:

141 DAVID CORSON; 142 JOHN CORSON, III.

32 THREE HUNDRED YEARS WITH THE CORSON FAMILIES

The authority for the identification of his sons is an old manuscript history of about ten pages, of the early generations, written many years ago by John M. Corson, a grandson of Joseph the first. This old family history was loaned to the compiler by Mr. Chas. E. Corson of The Dalles, Oregon. It was very helpful in straightening out some of the discrepancies that existed in the meager available charts and records of the early generations.

15 MARTHA CORSON, probably the youngest child of John and Mary (Daws) Corson, married John Willets on Oct. 15, 1716. The ceremony was performed by Justice John Townsend. John Willets was the son of Hope Willets and was born in Cape May County in 1688. Hope Willets was the son of Richard, who is said to have come from Wales in the 17th century and settled in New London, Conn., thence to Long Island; his son, Hope, settled in Cape May. John Willets was a judge for many years, and a member of the Legislature in 1743-44. He died after 1763. Martha (Corson) and John Willets had the following sons:

151 ISAAC WILLETS;

152 JAMES WILLETS;

153 JACOB WILLETS. They had at least one daughter;

154 HANNAH WILLETS, born Mar., 1730, married 243 Darius Corson.

VII

THE THIRD GENERATION

THE DESCENDANTS OF PETER AND DEBORAH CORSON

21 CHRISTIAN CORSON was without much doubt the eldest son of Peter and Deborah Corson. He probably was born in Gravesend, L. I., between 1680 and 1685. As in the case of others of this generation little is known about Christian. As hereinbefore mentioned, he purchased 100 acres of land from the West Jersey Society in the year 1719. He evidently died in the same year as his father. In fact, the inventory of his estate was returned Apr. 22, 1731, just three days before the inventory of his father's estate was filed. The administratrix of Christian Corson was Ann Corson, Spinster, appointed Apr. 28, 1731, just one day before Deborah Corson qualified as administratrix of Peter Corson's estate. From the fact that the father and son died so close together and that neither left a will, it is suggested that they may have died from an accident or epidemic. Concerning "Ann Corson, spinster," named as administratrix of Christian's estate and "Deborah Corson, spinster," the administratrix of Peter's estate, it seems, if the appellation "spinster" was used as it is used today, that there can be no question but that neither was the wife of the deceased. Webster's New International Dictionary says under "Spinster," "Formerly, an addition or title-Its use as appended to married women in legal proceedings survived later in America than in England." It is the opinion of the compiler that in these instances the word "spinster" was used as an addition or title, as Esq. for men today, and that Ann Corson was the wife of Christian. From authentic records, heretofore mentioned, it was established that Peter Corson's wife was Deborah and as no mention was found in any of the preserved records, that Peter and Deborah had a daughter, Deborah, it seems that the administratrix for Peter Corson's estate must have been his wife. Among the witnesses to the marriage of Robert Champion and Mary Mayps, before Justice Townsend, June 17, 1715, appear the names, Peter Corson, Deborah Corson, Christian Corson, Ann Corson, Catren Corson, Elizabeth Corson, and John Corson. We know that Deborah Corson, whose name follows that of her husband, was the wife of Peter, Sr. Ann Corson, whose name follows the name of Christian Corson, was, in the opinion of the compiler, the wife of Christian. Catren, Elizabeth and John were children of Christian and Ann.

Another record that indicates that Ann Corson was probably the wife of Christian is the marriage license record found in Bk. 1727-34, p. 224, in the Secretary of State's office at Trenton, as follows: "John Leonard to Ann Corson, widdow, Dec. 29, 1732." It was probably Christian's widow that married John Leonard. In the administration of Christian's estate, Peter Corson was fellow bondsman. Peter was Christian's brother. The inventory showed the property was appraised at $\pm 174.0.11$, and included smiths' tools, one-fourth of a shallop, oxen, cows, etc. The appraisors were Robert Townsend and Henry Young. From the fact that Christian had an interest in a shallop (a sort of large boat with two masts), it seems likely that he was a mariner, as well as "husbandman" (farmer) as named in the intestacy. The children of Christian and Ann Corson are listed as follows:

- 211 CHRISTIAN CORSON, II;
- 212 CATREN CORSON;
- 213 JOHN CORSON;
- 214 ELIZABETH CORSON;
- 215 ANDREW CORSON;
- 216 JOSEPH CORSON, born Sept. 6, 1716.

22 ABIGAIL CORSON, the only daughter of Peter and Deborah Corson, whose identity was clearly established, was probably born in the period 1680-90, as she was a widow with five children in 1709. She is identified as the daughter of Peter Corson by the will of her first husband, Shamgar Hand, Jr., dated June 4, 1707, and proved Nov. 16, 1709. In this will he names his wife, Abigail, sons, Cornelius, William, and according to an abstract of the will in the New Jersey Archives, "apparently other children." The wife was made executrix with "father-in-law, Petter Corson, and brother, Cornelius Hand, as overseers." Her first husband, Shamgar Hand, II, was the son of Shamgar Hand, the first, who purchased 1,000 acres of land, about 1690, near where Cape May Court House is now located. Shamgar Hand, I, married Sarah Pierson. He was born about 1640 and with his brothers, Benjamin born 1642 and Thomas born 1646, immigrated from East Hampton, Long Island, to Cape May County, N. J., probably before 1690.

They were the sons of John Hand, born about 1611 at Stanstede, Kent County, England, who married Alice Stansborough in England (some authorities say his wife was Alice Gransden, daughter of Henry Gransden of Sunbridge, Eng.). John Hand was at Lynn, Mass., in 1635. Originally settled at Southampton, L. I., in 1644. Proprietor of East Hampton, L. I., in 1649. Inventory of estate dated Jan. 24, 1660. Other children of John Hand were: John, Jr., born 1633, Stephen born 1635, Mary born 1636, Joseph born 1638, died 1724, James born 1644, and a daughter. The latter children are said to have died on Long Island.

The marriage of Abigail Corson to Shamgar Hand, II, was probably the first intermarriage of these two pioneer families that were to be united by marriage many times later. The children of Abigail (Corson) and Shamgar Hand, II, were identified by the will of Shamgar Hand, the first, dated Mar. 16, 1728, and proved Apr. 22, 1728. They were named as follows:

Abigail Corson married, second, Henry Young. The proof of this marriage has been established (1) from the ear mark record of Shamgar Hand, Jr., which follows:

"shamgar hand, Juner records his ear mark Apr. 30, 1707, Later henry young's his Suckseeder (successor)."

(From Liber A, Records of Cape May County Stillwell's Historical Miscellany, Vol. 1, p. 405.) It is established (2) from the will of Cornelius Hand, the son of Abigail (Corson) and Shamgar Hand, II. An abstract of this will follows:

"1732, Nov. 7, Will of Cornelius Hand of Cape May Co. Wife, Deborah; son, Cornelius (not 21); daughter-in-law (step-daughter), Deborah Taylor. Executors, wife and "my honorable father-in-law (step-father), Henry Young." Will proved Mar. 31, 1733. Inventory, Nov. 18, 1732.

That the terms, "daughter-in-law" and "father-in-law" in this will, as in other Cape May wills of this period were misused and in these instances were intended to mean, step-daughter and stepfather was verified by a careful examination of Cape May County records. They established very clearly that Cornelius Hand, the son of Abigail (Corson) and Shamgar Hand, II, married Deborah (Garrison) Taylor, the widow of John Taylor, who died about 1728, and that Deborah Taylor, named as a daughter-in-law of Cornelius Hand in the latter's will was the daughter of his wife and her former husband, John Taylor. Consequently, the daughter of Cornelius Hand's wife of her first marriage to John Taylor, was the step-daughter of Cornelius Hand and not his daughter-inlaw. Likewise, the term, father-in-law, as it refers to Henry Young in the will of Cornelius Hand, was wrongly used, as the maiden name of the wife of Cornelius Hand is clearly established as Deborah Garrison and not Deborah Young. (See J. E. Stillwell's Historical Miscellany, Vol. 1, p. 395 for marriage of John Taylor and Deborah Garrison: N. J. Archives, 1st Ser., Vol. 13, p. 453, for record of settlement of estate of John Taylor.)

Again it is indicated that Abigail Corson was the wife of Henry Young in the names of the witnesses at the marriage of Robert Champion and Mary Mayps, before John Townsend, Justice of the Peace, June 17, 1715. The Corsons named as witnesses, seemingly, are Peter Corson, I, his wife, Deborah, and their children and grandchildren. In the list appears the name of Abigail Young and Henry Young. In the will of Henry Young he requested "to be buried as near my first wife, Abigail, as possible."

Henry Young was the ancestor of all the Youngs in Cape May County and thus were the Corson and Young families united, a union that was indicated in the records before it was established. Henry Young was born in 1690, and was in Cape May County as early as 1713. From Steven's "John Townsend" we find he "was King's Colony surveyor in 1716 and deputy surveyor for the West Jersey Society in the years 1727, 1729, 1730, 1733, 1735, 1739, 1745, 1746, and 1750. He was Commissioner of the Peace and Sheriff of Cape May County, 1722-23; loan officer from 1733 to 1742; member of the Colonial Assembly from Cape May County during the years 1733-40, inclusive; loan officer again 1746-53; Surrogate of the County from 1741 until his death in 1767; Major of Cape May and Salem County militia in 1739; Colonel of Militia in King George's War (1748); Colonel of regiment of foot soldiers in Canadian Expedition, French and Indian War (1756)."

He seems to have been married three times, the name of his second wife remaining unknown, and the third having been Phoebe (Ludlam) Norton, daughter of Joseph Ludlam, Sr., and widow of Daniel Norton, to whom he (Henry Young) was married, Dec. 28, 1757. The children of Abigail (Corson) and Henry Young are listed as follows:

226 STEPHEN YOUNG, married Anne -----;

227 DEBORAH YOUNG, married Clement Daniels, Oct. 24, 1737;

228 TABITHA YOUNG, born Oct. 27, 1718;

229 PHOEBE YOUNG, married William Robinson, June 20, 1738;

22:10: ——— Young, married ——— Godfrey and had a daughter, Mehetibel; 22:11: ABIGAIL YOUNG, married, first, Joseph Ludlam, Aug. 17, 1747, second, Jonathan Smith, June 27, 1758;

22:12: ELIZABETH YOUNG, married John Mackey, Apr. 25, 1746;

22:13: JOB YOUNG, married Mary Norton, Apr. 26, 1757, daughter of Nathaniel Norton and Eunice Hand, daughter of George Hand, Sr.

The date of Henry Young's death was recorded in John Townsend's diary: "Our father Henry Young Esq. after a long illness of near eight months departed this life, Apr. 8, 1767, in the 77th year of his age."

His will, dated July 17, 1762, proved June 2, 1767, mentions the following: sons, Stephen and Job; daughters, Tabitha Townsend, Abigail Smith, Elizabeth Mackey; granddaughter, Mehetibel Godfrey. Deborah and Phoebe, probably, were deceased in 1762.

23 MARY CORSON is listed as the third child of Peter and Deborah Corson. While the proof of her identity is entirely circumstantial, nevertheless it seems to leave no doubt of her parentage. She married four times. Her first husband was Joseph Maypse, whose son,

231 JOSEPH MAYPSE, JR., whose birth was recorded on July 25, 1714, in the Minutes of the Friends Meeting of Great Egg Harbor, was identified by the will of Mary's third husband.

Ruth Maypse, who married John Wright by license of Dec. 24, 1733, was probably another child, although the proof was not found. John Wright lived on the plantation adjoining that of Mary Corson's second husband.

Mary (Corson) Maypse married, second, Robert Champion. This marriage is recorded at Cape May Court House in an old book of deeds, wills, marriage records, etc., of Cape May County between 1691 and 1720. It was recorded by John Townsend, Justice of the Peace, under date of June 17, 1715, and in this record is hidden circumstantial evidence that Mary was the daughter of Peter and Deborah Corson. After the names of the groom and bride, Robert Champion and Mary Maypse in this marriage record appear the names of the following witnesses: John Champion; Peter Corson; Deborah Corson; Christian Corson; Samuel Champion; Ann Corson; Catren Corson; Abigail Young; Elizabeth Corson; Henry Young; Robert Townsend; John Corson; Joseph Goldin; Samuel Shivers; Thomas Shivers; Thomas Gandy.

In these early Cape May marriage records it seems to have been the usual custom for the parents of the groom to sign below the names of the newly weds, followed by the names of the parents of the bride, after which may follow the names of other close relatives and friends. The first named witness to this marriage has been identified as the father of Robert Champion. Then followed the names of Peter and Deborah Corson, who no doubt were the parents of the bride, who was the widow of Joseph Maypse. Christian Corson was the bride's brother; Samuel Champion, probably, was a relative of the groom; Ann Corson was Christian's wife; Abigail Young was the sister of the bride and wife of Henry Young; Robert Townsend was a first cousin of the groom; Catren, Elizabeth, and John Corson were probably children of Christian. Joseph Goldin, Samuel Shivers and Thomas Gandy were friends and neighbors.

Robert Champion, the second husband of Mary Corson, was born at Westbury, Long Island, about 1685. He lived on Cooper's Creek about eight miles from the present city of Camden, N. J. Mr. H. C. Campion, Jr., of Philadelphia, Pa., who has gathered much data about the Champion family, commented concerning Robert Champion as follows: "It might be thought strange that Robert Champion should have married so far away from his place of residence, but when you know, as I do, that his older brother, Thomas Champion, lived on the Tuckahoe River, it could be easily understood how he came to be in that locality, probably visiting or staying with his brother, and hence became acquainted with this widow. Besides, Robert had many relatives living in Cape May and Gloucester Counties, as he was the son of John Champion and his wife, Sarah Williams. Sarah Williams was a sister of Phoebe Williams, who was the first wife of John Townsend, Jr., who died in 1721, in Cape May County (hence was uncle by marriage of the above groom) and was ancestor of all those of the name living in South Jersey. She also was the sister of Esther Williams, who married Thomas Cock, whose daughter, Charity Cock, born at Oyster Bay, Long Island, married Samuel Johnson, who lived in Goshen in Cape May County; and also a sister of Mary Dole, wife of John Dole, who died in Gloucester County not far from where Robert Champion lived in 1716, whose son, Joseph Dole, married Hannah Somers and lived at Great Egg Harbor, Gloucester County, so that he had many relatives along the seashore in the neighborhood where he married his wife."

Mary (Corson) and Robert Champion had one son:

232 PETER CHAMPION, who probably was named after his grandfather, Peter Corson.

It is not known when Robert Champion died, but on Apr. 19, 1728, license was issued in Gloucester County for the marriage of

Mary Champion to her third husband, Jonathan Belldon. To them were born three children:

233 SYDONIA BELLDON;234 MARY BELLDON;235 HEZEKIAH BELLDON.

Mary's third husband died prior to April 7, 1737, on which date his will was proved. In this will, dated Oct. 4, 1735, Jonathan Belldon gave his residence as Waterford Township, Gloucester County, and was referred to as "Cordwainer" (shoemaker). He mentioned his wife, Mary, daughters, Sydonia and Mary, who were to learn housewifery and to read the Bible, infant son, Hezekiah, and stepsons, Joseph Maypse and Peter Champion. He named his friend, Ephraim Tomlinson, as executor. The witnesses were John Shivers, Michael Grumley and Josiah Shivers.

Mary (Corson) (Maypse) (Champion) Belldon married, fourth, John Eastlack of Gloucester County, by license of June 27, 1737. No record of children of this marriage was found. Nor were the dates of death of Mary or her fourth husband.

24 PETER CORSON, JR., or the second, was probably the youngest child of Peter, Sr., and Deborah Corson. The date of his birth was probably in the period 1690 to 1700. He seems to have been a man of influence in the community and to have had a large estate, his father having conveyed nearly six hundred acress of land to him in the deeds of June 6, 1726, and Feb. 11, 1729. He was referred to as "Gentleman" in his will, dated Dec. 12, 1760, and proved Apr. 4, 1764. Prior to 1722 he married Rachel ——. The names of her parents were not disclosed by the records that were examined. Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson were Quakers, as the records of their decease and the birth of their eleven children were recorded in the Minutes of the Great Egg Harbor and Cape May Friends' Monthly Meetings. Peter Corson died Dec. 29, 1763, and Rachel, his wife, died Apr. 17, 1764. Their children were as follows:

THE FOURTH GENERATION

THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN AND MARY CORSON

121 JACOB CORSON, JR., who was probably the eldest son of Jacob, I, and Naomi Corson, could hardly have been of age when his father died in 1737. It is the opinion of the compiler that all of the elder Jacob's children were minors when their father died and probably for some years afterward. As stated heretofore, Jacob Junior's mother, according to the will of his father, was to have the homestead place as long as she remained his widow, and then it was to go to their sons, Jacob, Jr., and Peter. About four months before Peter married, this land was partitioned, Peter paying Jacob, Jr., £100 for his choice of the tract. Jacob, Jr., married Charity Stillwell, the daughter of Nicholas, and a descendant of the family, whose names were associated with Carsten Jansen and his sons, when they lived on Long Island.

By a comparison of various dates and data, it would seem probable that Jacob, Jr., did not marry many years before this land was divided, and Jacob, Jr., and Peter gave each other quit claim deeds in 1756. Jacob and Peter no doubt lived with the mother until her death, and after her decease came into possession of the tract bequeathed to her in 1737. During the Revolutionary War, Jacob Corson served as a seaman under Hope Willets, who had charge of the Privateers "Black Jack" and "Luck and Fortune." He also served as a private under Capt. James Willets, 2nd Battalion, Cape May Infantry. (Steven's History, Cape May County, pp. 197-202.) Jacob, Jr., died between Jan. 12, 1803, the date his will was signed, and Jan. 31, 1803, the date it was proved. In it his residence was given as Upper Township, Cape May County. From his will we may gather that he was a large landowner. He bequeathed his estate as follows: Grandson, Equila Corson, my homestead plantation and marsh that I bought of the Executors of Jacob Spicer; also my cedar swamp; but my son, Eli Corson, and his wife shall have the place as long as they live. Grandson, James Corson, son of Parmenas Corson, 50 acres of land on the south side of the place where his father now lives, that I bought

of Richard Thompson; and the rest of the place to my son, Parmenas. He bequeathed personal property to his sons: Jacob, Job, and Jeremy, and daughter, Priscilla Peterson. His grandsons, Benajah, and Nicholas, son of Nicholas Corson, deceased, and granddaughters: Angeline Corson, Charity Corson, and Lettice Corson also shared in the personal property. Executors were his sons: Eli and Job. Witnesses: Henry Young, Robert Pedrick and Uriah Smith. The inventory was made by Cornelius Corson and Lewis Corson on Feb. 16, 1803.

The children of Jacob, Jr., and Charity (Stillwell) Corson are listed as follows:

Ellis Corson, whose inventory was made by Parmenas and Jesse Corson, Mar. 9, 1789, was probably another son. Eli Corson was his administrator, with Jacob Corson as bondsman.

122 PETER CORSON, listed as the second son of Jacob and Naomi Corson, married Martha Edwards on Feb. 10, 1757. Peter Corson died intestate before 1797, and his children were identified by several deeds (the first of which was dated in that year) that were made in the settlement of his estate. These deeds also show that Peter Corson was the owner of considerable land. In the first deed, dated Jan. 23, 1797, Cornelius Corson and his wife, Sarah Corson, and Enoch Young and his wife, Deborah (Corson) Young, son and daughter, heirs of Peter Corson, deceased, conveyed 147 acres to Jonathan Corson, which tract it was stated consisted of two parts, one of which had been purchased by Peter Corson, deceased, from Jacob Spicer's executors and the other given to Peter Corson, by his father, and further strengthened by deeds given by Jacob Corson, Oct. 16, 1756, on which date Peter gave his brother 100 pounds for being allowed his choice of the bequeathed land and each gave quit claim deeds. The consideration in the deed from Cornelius to Jonathan was 200 pounds and this deed was recorded on Jan. 2, 1804. (Deed Book C, p. 306, Cape May Court House.) By a second deed, dated Aug. 9, 1803, Jonathan Corson and Lydia Corson, his wife, son and heir of Peter Corson, deceased, conveyed this same tract to Elias Corson

for the sum of \$950. This deed, recorded on the same day as the first one, Jan. 2, 1804, was also found at Cape May Court House in Deed Book C, p. 311. By another deed, dated Mar. 11, 1797, Elias Corson and Sarah, his wife, conveyed 13 acres of land to Cornelius Corson. Eleven acres of this tract had been purchased by Peter Corson, deceased, from Jeremiah VanGilder, and two acres had been purchased by Peter from John Corson, by deed, on Mar. 20, 1775. This latter deed was recorded Apr. 18, 1801. The residence of all the parties is given in these deeds as Upper Township, Cape May County. Martha Corson, the wife of Peter, lived until about 1821, her will being proved on Aug. 21 of that year. In this will she named the children and heirs of her eldest son, Cornelius Corson, deceased; granddaughter, Mary Godfrey (late Mary Young), daughter of Enoch and Deborah Young, deceased; and her two sons, Elias Corson and Jonathan Corson. Peter and Martha Corson's children are listed and indexed as follows:

123 JEREMIAH CORSON seems to have been the third son of Jacob and Naomi Corson. He died intestate and his brother, Jacob Corson, was appointed administrator Dec. 27, 1776. Fellow bondsman was Joseph Edwards. Inventory for £629.17.8 was made by Joseph Edwards and Hugh Hathorn on Dec. 18, 1776. He was probably a bachelor as no record of marriage or issue was found. (Liber 22, p. 43.)

124 RACHEL CORSON, the daughter of Jacob and Naomi Corson, was a minor according to her father's will proved in 1737. She married, Jan. 22, 1759, her cousin, Joseph Corson, I, the son of Christian, I. Their children will be listed under the descendants of Peter the first.

125 AMY CORSON, daughter of Jacob and Naomi, was also a minor in 1737. Whether she married and left descendants was not learned.

126 MARTHA CORSON, daughter of Jacob and Naomi Corson, married her first cousin, 142 John Corson, III, son of John, II, and Susannah Corson. Their children will be listed under the issue of John, III.

141 DAVID CORSON, probably the eldest son of John, II, and Susannah Corson, married Rebecca Godfrey. This is probably the first intermarriage of the Corson and Godfrey families, the latter being descended from Benjamin Godfrey, another Cape May pioneer, who was in the county about 1690. David Corson was no doubt one of the two of the name who petitioned in the spring of 1777-78 to the Governor, Captain General, and Commander-in-Chief of the State of New Jersey, requesting that the militia of Cape May be exempt from service abroad, in order that the shores of Cape May should be better protected from the enemy. He probably was the David Corson who was a private in Capt. James Willetts' Company, Cape May Battalion, New Jersey Militia, in the Revolutionary War. His name also appears in an association of persons, formed in 1752, to buy from the West Jersey Society, all its rights in the county. The children of David and Rebecca (Godfrey) Corson are listed as follows:

David Corson died intestate about 1810. Inventory was made Sept. 6, 1810. (Record 847 E.)

142 JOHN CORSON, III, was probably the youngest son of John, II, and Susannah Corson. He married his first cousin, 126 Martha Corson, the daughter of Jacob and Naomi Corson. This was one of the first intermarriages of the descendants of John and Peter Corson, which became so common in the later generations. However, this is one of the few instances in which the contracting parties were as closely related as first cousins. John Corson, III, without much doubt can be identified as the private in Capt. James Willetts' Company, Cape May Battalion, New Jersey Militia, in the Revolutionary War, of the same name. He was a second cousin of Captain Willetts and seemed to be the only John Corson in Cape May County of proper age for military duty at the Revolutionary War period. The following certification was received Jan. 28, 1932, from the Office of Adjutant General, Trenton, N. J.:

"CORSON, JOHN-served as Private, Captain Willetts' Company, Cape May Militia."

Signed:

"FREDERICK GILKYSON, The Adjutant General." John and Martha Corson lived in Upper Township and had the following children:

John Corson, III, died intestate probably in 1803. Inventory was made Oct. 7, 1803. Martha Corson was made administratrix Oct. 6, 1803.

152 JAMES WILLETTS was the son of Martha (Corson) and John Willetts. The name of his wife was not learned. The dates of birth of their children, as taken from an old Bible, were furnished by Mrs. Letitia Y. C. Tomlin of Westfield, N. J. They are as follows:

THE FOURTH GENERATION

THE DESCENDANTS OF PETER AND DEBORAH CORSON

211 CHRISTIAN CORSON, JR., or the second, is placed by the compiler as the eldest son of Christian, I, and Ann Corson. From what has been gathered from the meager records concerning him, there is not much doubt that he and his family moved from the seaside of Upper Township to the bayside of Middle Township. This supposition is supported by the fact that the place of residence of his sons, as given in their wills, is recorded as the latter location, and accounts for the history of his family not being recorded as accurately as that of the families in Upper Township, where the great majority of the early families lived. His wife was not identified and the names of his daughters, if he had any, were not found. From wills and other records, the names of his sons are listed as follows:

2111 DAVID CORSON;

2112 ABNER CORSON, born June 25, 1729;

2113 CHRISTIAN CORSON, III;

2114 NATHAN CORSON.

213 JOHN CORSON, SR., probably the second son of Christian and Ann Corson, was born, apparently, in the decade 1700-10. He married Mary Goff. The record of this marriage was found by my cousin, Alan Corson, in the Secretary of State's Office in Trenton, in Marriage License Book, 1727 to 1734, p. 155. This record follows: "On June 4, 1731, license issued to John Corson and Mary Goff, both of Cape May County." Mary Goff was probably a granddaughter of John Goff, born Nov., 1666, the son of Samuel Goff (born -----, died Jan. 15, 1706) and Ann Bernard (born 1635, died 1679) and grandson of Edward Goffe, born at Cambridge, England, married, first, Joyce -----, who died in 1638, and, second, Margaret Wilkinson. Edward and Joyce Goffe, with their children, Samuel and Lydia, embarked late in 1634 in the ship "Good Hope" from Ipswich, England, with the Rev. Thos. Sheppard, who had been expelled from Emanuel College, Cambridge University, because of his Puritan activities. They landed at Watertown, Mass., early in 1635. John Goff, the grandfather of Mary Goff, sailed in a whaler from Norwalk, Conn., and settled, about 1700, at Tarkill, on the Tuckahoe River, in Cape May County, and about 2 miles from the Cape May-Cumberland County boundary line, as such boundary lines exist today. John Goff bought land at West Creek, on the bayside of the county in 1710-12, but according to family tradition the older Goffs were born at Tarkill and lived and died there. It is said the Goffs did not occupy the land at West Creek until a much later period. Many of the family lived in this district near Tarkil, either in Cape May or Cumberland Counties.

John, Sr., and Mary (Goff) Corson, it seems, lived on the seashore side of Upper Township, where the majority of the Corson families resided for many years, but late in life, probably in the decade 1760-70, with his children and their families, moved to the vicinity of the Goff holdings. The Goff family no doubt was the magnet that drew them away from the seashore. He seems to have sold some of his land on the seashore to his brother, Joseph, who in his will, dated 1793, mentions land bought from John Corson, deceased. Although the district to which he moved was not far from the seashore, as we consider distance today, it was distant enough to cause his family's history to be poorly preserved, as was the history of his brother, Christian, II's, family after they moved to the bayside of Middle Township.

John Corson died between May 6, 1779, the date he made his will, and May 12, 1779, when the inventory of his estate, amounting to £323.9.6 was made by David Goff and Frederick Peterson. David Goff lived in Cape May County, but the residence of Frederick Peterson, when he married Ellenor Lore, Nov. 3, 1775, was given as Cumberland County. The will of John Corson, proved June 26, 1779, gave his residence as Cape May County, and provided as follows: "Else Lord is to have her freedom dues out of my estate; and, if there is any left, my sons and daughters are to have it." Executor—James Hollinshead; Witnesses— Frederick Moslander, William Moslander, and Aaron Hand. The executor and witnesses all seem to have lived in Cumberland County. Else (Elsie) Lord probably had been bound out to John Corson, Sr., or he may have been her guardian.

James Hollingshead did not act as executor. While the reason for his renunciation was not stated, the apparent cause is that he was at that time in the military service in the Revolutionary War, as Captain, First Battalion, Cumberland County Militia. (Stryker, p. 394.) His renunciation as executor, dated June 14, 1779, was witnessed by Aaron Peterson and Joseph Corson. Aaron Peterson's residence was named as Cumberland County when he married Martha Hollingshead, Mar. 25, 1779, and he probably was the son-in-law of Captain Hollingshead. Joseph Corson was a grandson of the deceased, John Corson, Sr., and the grandson's name appeared as a witness, no doubt, in place of his father, John Corson, Jr., who was also in the military service. (Stryker, pp. 554-55.)

After James Hollingshead's renunciation, we can reasonably assume that one of the family would seek to serve as administrator. June 26, 1779, Jeremiah Corson qualified as administrator, with David Goff as fellow bondsman, both of Cape May County, yeomen; witnesses were Frederick Moslander and Aaron Hand. The Moslander families lived in the Maurice River, Cumberland County, district, and Aaron Hand's residence, when he married Ann Lowring, May 10, 1777, was given as Cumberland County. That John Corson, Sr., at the time of his decease lived near the Cumberland County line is apparent. The records indicate the following were children of John, Sr., and Mary (Goff) Corson:

2131 RHODA CORSON, married William Robinson, Aug. 13, 1754;

- 2132 JOHN CORSON, JR., married Mary Goff of Cumberland County, Dec. 19, 1761;

Joseph Lord's residence was given as Maurice River, Cumberland County. The husband of Flowander may have been Joshua or William Corson, whose names appear in this district and who possibly were sons of John, Sr., and Mary (Goff) Corson.

215 ANDREW CORSON, listed as the third son of Christian the first and Ann Corson, also seems to have left the Atlantic seaboard, as his will proved, Nov. 25, 1792, gave his residence as Maurice River, Cumberland County. He probably moved to Cumberland County about 1762, when he conveyed land to his brother, Joseph Corson. In his will be mentions the following children:

2151 ISAAC CORSON, who had a son,

21511 ISAAC CORSON, JR.;

2152 ANDREW CORSON, JR., probably a bachelor, as his share after his death was devised by his father to Nathan Newton, who was executor and friend of the deceased;

2153 ABEL CORSON;

2154 HANNAH CORSON, who was named as Hannah Steelman;

- 2155 DEBORAH CORSON, who married John Drummond, Feb. 29, 1772, and had children,
 - 21551 SILVIA DRUMMOND,;
 - 21552 HANNAH DRUMMOND, who married Howard.

Deborah was no doubt deceased before her father made his will, as she was not named. Silvia and Hannah Howard were named as grandchildren.

216 JOSEPH CORSON, apparently, was the youngest son of Christian and Ann Corson. He was born Sept. 6, 1716, and married 124 Rachel Corson, the daughter of Jacob and Naomi Corson, Jan. 22, 1759. The History of Petersburg, by Stanley Craig, says of him: "In 1745, he was a grand juror; in 1762, he, with others, petitioned the Legislature for a toll bridge over Cedar Swamp Creek at Fast Landing, now called the Lower Bridge. The same year he was commissioned Judge of the Court of Common Pleas; in 1767, he was made a Justice of the Peace, and in 1775, he was a member of the Committee of Safety." Joseph Corson, Sr., was a man of much property, as the following abstract of his will bears witness:

1793, Mar. 19, Corson, Joseph, Sr., of Cape May Co., N. J., will of. Wife, Rachel, 1/3 of my personal and real estate. Eldest son, Parmenas, the plantation where I live and the land adjoining thereto; also the plantation I bought of Daniel Brandreth, joining lands of Jas. Godfrey, and that tract which I bought of Clement Daniels and Randal Daniels; also the salt meadow on the northwest side of Tide Pond near Bushy Island, which I bought of Jacob Spicer's Executors; also a salt meadow near the mouth of Cedar Swamp Creek; also a cedar swamp (bought from the Society) which joins the swamp of Peter Corson; also a swamp bought of Sylvanus Townsend, Sr.; also 1/2 of the cedar swamp near Dennis creek bought from John Stanaland; also 1/2 of a swamp I have in partnership with John Stites bought of Jonathan Townsend. To my second and youngest son, Joseph, the three tracts of land where he lives, on southeast side of Cedar Swamp Creek, and lands of said Creek I bought of John Vangilder; and lands at the Saw Scaffle, bought by my grandfather, Peter Corson, from the Society, which joins land of Peter Corson, Jr. (1223); also a cedar swamp bought of John Mackey; also one bought of John Corson, deceased, joining land of Peter Corson, Sr.; also one bought of George Stites, joining Eli Townsend and Elijah Townsend, and 1/2 of a swamp held in Partnership with John Stites. Executors-wife, Rachel, and sons, Parmenas and Joseph. Witnesses-Eli Townsend, Mathias Woodruff, Nicholas Willets and John Townsend. Proved Aug. 7, 1795. 1793, Aug. 6, Inventory £324.10.8, made by Eli Townsend and Daniel Townsend. (Liber 33, p. 276 (585 E) Trenton, N. J.)

Joseph, Sr., and Rachel (Corson) Corson had three sons:

226 STEPHEN YOUNG, the son of Abigail (Corson) and Henry Young, in his will, dated Feb. 16, 1774, and proved July 8, 1778, named his wife as Anne. Her maiden name was not ascertained. They resided in Upper Township, Cape May County. He seems to have been a large landowner. His homestead was bounded by the lands of John Willets, Hugh Hathorn, Joseph Corson, Darius Corson, Joseph Edwards, Joseph Badcock, John Baker, Noah Garretson, and James Garretson. According to his will he was survived by the following children:

228 TABITHA YOUNG, born Oct. 27, 1718, the daughter of Abigail (Corson) and her second husband, Henry Young, married Dec. 1, 1740, John Townsend. He was born Oct. 29, 1706, the second child of Richard and Millicent (Somers) Townsend, in a family of eleven children. John Townsend previously had married, Sept. 6, 1733, Sarah Champion, five children having been born to the first union. John and Tabitha (Young) Townsend lived in Upper Township, Cape May County, N. J. They had nine children:

Tabitha (Young) Townsend died Apr. 2, 1793. John Townsend, her husband, died Sept. 23, 1785. The five children of John Townsend and his first wife, Sarah Champion, were named: Amy; David; Rachel; Millicent; Richard. 22:11: ABIGAIL YOUNG, daughter of Abigail (Corson) and Henry Young, married, first, Aug. 17, 1747, Joseph Ludlam, Jr., second, June 27, 1758, Jonathan Smith. The latter in his will, proved Sept. 17, 1767, named seven children. Several of these children may have been of a previous marriage. One-half of his moveable estate was left to his daughters, Sarah Smith and Hannah Smith, and "his youngest sons," Jonathan, Carmon, and Jeremiah Smith. They may have been the children of his second wife, Abigail Young.

22:12: ELIZABETH YOUNG, the daughter of Abigail (Corson) and Henry Young, married, Apr. 25, 1746, John Mackey. He was one of Cape May County's outstanding settlers. Miss Fannie E. Corson of New Berlin, Ill., told the following interesting story about John Mackey's early life. It was related to her by her grandfather, John Mackey Corson, who was a grandson of "John Mackey was a poor Irish boy who sold John Mackey. himself to pay his passage to this country. He worked that out and then bound himself out to learn the wheelwright trade. After serving his apprenticeship he worked at his trade and bought land near Petersburg, N. J., with his earnings. The land was covered with timber and John Mackey, after working at his trade all day, would work at clearing his land at night. He became one of the largest landowners in Cape May County."

In connection with the "Mackey" plantation of 740 acres, the following note in Jacob Spicer's diary, under date of Feb. 22, 1756, is interesting: "John Mackey's house is 40x25, single story with hip, for which Joseph Edwards is to get the timber, frame, cover, make window frames, sashes, put in the lights, make the outside doors, lay the floors for $\pounds 16$, for himself and workmen. Mackey is to find lath, shingles, sawed and fit for covering."

John Mackey held many public offices of trust in Cape May County. He was a freeholder in 1764; Justice of the Peace in 1767, 1771, 1773; Justice of the Court of Oyer and Terminer, 1773; Lieutenant Colonel, Cape May Militia, 1771 to 1777. On Sept. 21, 1775, the people of Cape May County elected the officers for the newly authorized Cape May Battalion. John Mackey, Esq., was made Colonel. He was commissioned Colonel on May 7, 1777. After the Battle of Brandywine, by order of Governor Livingston, the Cape May and neighboring militia were ordered to rendezvous at Woodbury immediately. This was accomplished and on Sept. 22, Colonel Mackey's command crossed the Delaware to join General Armstrong, under whom they fought in the Battle of Germantown. Colonel Mackey resigned his commission Mar. 27, 1778, and was succeeded by Nicholas Stillwell. John Mackey was a Quaker.

241 BENJAMIN CORSON, the first child of Peter and Rachel Corson, born Aug. 20, 1722, died eight days later.

242 ZIBIAH CORSON, the eldest daughter of Peter and Rachel Corson, born June 24, 1723, married, Joseph Hildreth on Feb. 16, 1748.

243 DARIUS CORSON, the second son of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson, was born on Nov. 14, 1726. From the Minutes of the Great Egg Harbor and Cape May Friends Monthly Meetings it was found that Darius married his cousin, 154 Hannah Willets, the daughter of John M. and Martha (Corson) Willets, born on Mar. 3, 1730. She married Darius prior to 1752 and died on July 27, 1777. This union was the third intermarriage of the grandchildren of John and Peter the first. By a deed, dated Apr. 21, 1756, and proved June 21, 1756, Peter Corson, Jr., yeoman, conveyed 150 acres to Darius Corson, Tailor, for a consideration of £110. During the Revolutionary War, Darius Corson was one of the seamen that served under Hope Willets, who was in charge of the Privateers "Black Jack" and "Luck and Fortune." (Stevens' Hist. Cape May Co., p. 203.) The following record of the children of Darius and Hannah (Willets) Corson was secured from the Minutes of the Friends Monthly Meetings:

244 REM (REMINGTON) CORSON, born May 31, 1730, was the third son of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson. On Apr. 16, 1777, he helped "nominate, choose and appoint" the officers of Capt. James Willets, Jr.'s, Company, in which he was recorded as a private during its service in the Revolutionary War. He is recorded as taking the Oath of Allegiance to the New State Government on May 27, 1778. Rem Corson married Hannah Stillwell, daughter of Nicholas Stillwell, on Jan. 17, 1759, and they had the following children:

In his will, dated Oct. 7, 1798, and proved May 3, 1804, his residence is given as Upper Township, Cape May County, and mention is made of his homestead plantation, his salt meadow and cedar swamp, the place where his son, Constantine, lives, and his rights on Peck's Beach. His wife, Elizabeth, and the aforesaid children are named. The inventory for \$824.47 was made on June 1, 1804, by Henry Young and Cornelius Corson.

246 REBECCA CORSON was the sixth child of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson. She was born May 11, 1735, and married Daniel Townsend, Feb. 2, 1756. He was born Dec. 10, 1728, the eleventh son of Richard and Millicent (Somers) Townsend. They had a son:

2461 Peter Corson Townsend, born 1756.

247 LEVI CORSON was the seventh child of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson. He was born Nov. 17, 1737, and married Margaret Hand, Dec. 23, 1766. The record of this marriage was found in Marriage Book "C," p. 418, at Trenton, N. J.; the names of Levi Corson and David Edwards appear on the marriage bond; the witnesses were Job Young and Mary Young. Levi Corson served in the Revolutionary War as a private in Capt. James Willetts' Company, Cape May County Militia. (Stryker, p. 554.) A notation on Flora Corson Barnes' chart states: "Levi (husband of Mar. Hand) killed in Rev. War." The compiler was unable to further verify her statement. The names of the children of Levi were recorded in the John M. Corson manuscript; the dates of birth were secured from other sources. 249 JESSE CORSON, the ninth of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson's children, was born May 6, 1742. He married Martha Somers, May 5, 1767. He served as a private with his cousin, Capt. James Willets, Jr.'s, Company in the Revolutionary War, and on May 27, 1778, took the Oath of Allegiance to the new Colonial Government. Jesse and Martha (Somers) Corson had eleven children, their birth records being preserved in the Minutes of the Friends Meetings. Their children were:

249:10: ELIZABETH CORSON, the tenth child of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson, was born on Apr. 18, 1744. Whether she married and left descendants was not learned.

249:11: DEBORAH CORSON, the youngest of the children of Peter, Jr., and Rachel Corson, was born Jan. 27, 1747. Nothing further was found concerning her.

THE FIFTH GENERATION

THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN AND MARY CORSON

1211 PARMENAS CORSON, listed as the eldest son of Jacob and Charity (Stillwell) Corson, was probably born in the period 1750-55. He married two times, his first wife being Mary Lee, to whom he was married on Apr. 12, 1774. The record of this marriage is recorded at Trenton, N. J., in Marriage Book C, p. 558. Uriah Young and Parmenas Corson were named on the marriage bond, and the witnesses were Margery Smith and Priscilla Leaming. Parmenas Corson served in the War of 1812. (Presidents, Soldiers and Statesmen, V. 2, p. 1350.) Parmenas and Mary (Lee) Corson had nine children. The dates of birth of all except Naomi, who is mentioned in the will of her father, were secured by the compiler from Bible records. They follow:

The birth record of James was recorded in the family register of his old family Bible, and the birth records of the other seven children were secured from two pages, removed from an old Bible, and now in the possession of Mrs. Cara Ellen (Corson) Bevis of College Hill, Cincinnati. The page recording the birth records of James and Naomi had evidently been lost. Mary (Lee) Corson, the first wife, died on Apr. 17, 1805. Feb. 7, 1811, Parmenas married, second, Rhoda Lee. (Gloucester County Records.) She was mentioned in his will. There were no children by the second marriage. Parmenas, Sr., died on Oct. 20, 1832. His will, dated Sept. 19, 1828, and proved Oct. 31, 1832, mentions, beside his wife, Rhoda, all of his children in the order of their birth, except his son, Abel, who had died on May 3, 1827. It also mentions his grandsons, Parmenas and Jonas. 1212 NICHOLAS CORSON, listed as the second son of Jacob and Charity (Stillwell) Corson, married Lydia Ross. (F. C. B.) They had one son:

12121 NICHOLAS CORSON, born in 1779.

The father had died prior to Jan. 12, 1803, as Jacob Corson in his will, dated on that day, mentions his "grandson, Nicholas Corson, son of Nicholas Corson, deceased." Lydia (Ross) Corson married, second, George Souder. She died May 2, 1841, in her eighty-seventh year and is buried in Calvary Baptist Cemetery, Ocean View, N. J.

1213 ELI CORSON, probably the third son of Jacob and Charity (Stillwell) Corson, married Christeanna Thompson. They had three sons:

12131 Equila or Aquila Corson;12132 Benajah Corson;12133 John Corson.

According to the will of Eli's father (Jacob), Eli and his wife were to have the father's homestead plantation, that he had bought of the Executors of Jacob Spicer, as long as Eli lived, then it was to go to Eli's son, Aquila.

1214 JACOB CORSON, III, listed as the fourth child of Jacob, II, and Charity (Stillwell) Corson, married Sarah Johnson, Apr. 2, 1797. She was the daughter of David and Sarah Johnson. The mother, Sarah Johnson, of Upper Township, Cape May County, died leaving a will dated Oct. 6, 1800 and proved Apr. 4, 1803. In this will she mentioned her son-in-law, Jacob Corson and also named him as one of the executors. Jacob Corson, II, of Upper Township, the father of Jacob, III, made his will Jan. 12, 1803. It was proved 19 days later and conveyed to "Son, Jacob, 5 pounds, if at this time he be living." (Recorded at Trenton, 768 E.) Evidently Jacob, III, was missing when his father made his will. This fact seems further verified by the record by which Jeremiah Johnson was made administrator for the estate of Jacob Corson, Jr., deceased. James Ludlam and Israel Stites, Cape May, go on the administrator's bond, Feb. 1, 1803, the day after the will of Jacob, II, was proved. (Recorded at Trenton, 769 E.) Jeremiah Johnson, Esq., was named as a son of David and Sarah Johnson in their wills and no doubt it was the brother-in-law of the seemingly missing Jacob, who was made his administrator. Sarah (Johnson) Corson evidently assumed her husband was dead as she married Nathaniel Dickinson, Oct. 12, 1804. However, it seems the court was not satisfied that Jacob was deceased as a further examination of the records disclosed that, presumably, because the administrator, Jeremiah Johnson, had died prior to Feb. 12, 1816, James Ludlam was at this time appointed administrator De Bonis Non of Jacob Corson, Jr., deceased. The share of the missing Jacob Corson in his father's estate, in the hands of the deceased Jeremiah Johnson, was fixed at \$384.65 on Mar. 27, 1817, the date of this administration. The second administrator, James Ludlam, was probably the James Ludlam who married Martha Johnson, a sister of Jacob's wife, Sarah. What really happened to Jacob, III, was not disclosed, but it is probable that he was lost at sea. As no grandchildren were mentioned in the wills of David and Sarah Johnson as the children of Jacob, it may be safely assumed that he and Sarah had no children.

1215 PRISCILLA CORSON, apparently the only daughter of Jacob and Charity (Stillwell) Corson, married — Peterson. No record of any children of this union was found.

1216 JOB CORSON, listed as the sixth child of Jacob and Charity (Stillwell) Corson, married, Oct. 21, 1792, 2475 Rebecca Corson, the daughter of Levi and Margaret (Hand) Corson. They had nine children as follows:

1217 JEREMIAH CORSON, last mentioned in the will of Jacob, II, probably was the youngest child of Jacob and Charity (Stillwell) Corson. Whether he married and left children was not disclosed in the records examined.

1221 CORNELIUS CORSON, the eldest child of Peter and Martha (Edwards) Corson, was born in 1757. At the age of twenty years he with others of the Second Company of Cape May Battalion of Militia, elected the officers of the Company, with whom he served as a private in the Revolutionary War. Cornelius Corson married, prior to 1780, Sarah, whose maiden name, according to Mrs. Barnes' chart, was Corson. Whether Sarah was a

cousin to Cornelius was not verified as her parents were not identified. In the deed from Cornelius to his brother, Jonathan, given in administering their father's estate, the wife of Cornelius was named as Sarah Corson. Cornelius Corson was a large landowner; his will, dated Nov. 5, 1815, and proved Dec. 11, 1815, mentions beside his homestead plantation and other tracts joining same, a tract bought of Enoch Young; another tract laid off by the Commissioners appointed by the Orphans' Court, in the estate of David Corson, deceased, as the share of Enos Corson, from whom it was bought; also other tracts bought from Mathew Godfrey; from John Mackey; from Nicholas Willets and David Townsend, assigns of Eli Corson; from Elijah Shaw's heirs; also tract known as Elias Gandy tract; another which belonged to Peter Corson, deceased; and one referred to as a place called Indian Ordinary. The inventory for \$1,528.99 was made on Dec. 22, 1815, by John Mackey and Nicholas Willets. His residence was named as Upper Township, Cape May County. Cornelius and Sarah Corson had the following children:

1222 DEBORAH CORSON, probably the only daughter of Peter and Martha (Edwards) Corson, married Enoch Young. They had a daughter:

1223 PETER CORSON, JR., was the third child of Peter and Martha (Edwards) Corson. In the deed of Mar. 11, 1797, to his brother Cornelius Corson, given in the settlement of the father's estate, Peter's wife signed as Sarah Corson. Her maiden name was not disclosed, nor was it learned whether they had any children. As none of the early family trees or charts list any issue, it may be assumed that Peter and Sarah Corson had no children. The compiler wondered if Peter Corson, who died intestate in Gloucester County, N. J., and whose administratrix was Sarah Corson, appointed July 4, 1797, could have been Peter Corson, Jr., and his wife, Sarah, from Upper Township, Cape May County. (Liber 27, p. 108, Trenton, 2081 H.) In the old Methodist Cemeter, at Head of River, Tuckahoe, is this inscription: "Peter Corson died May 31, 1797, aged 23 years."

1224 ELIAS CORSON, the fourth child of Peter and Martha (Edwards) Corson, was born on Jan. 23, 1767. He was only ten years old when his eldest brother, Cornelius, went to war, and while too young to enlist, no doubt witnessed many interesting events of those times that tried men's souls. Elias married twice. His first wife was Sarah Evans and the second was Abigail Steelman. License for his marriage to Abigail was issued Oct. 11, 1810. (Gloucester Co. Records.) After the administration of his father's estate, Elias was in possession of 147 acres of land and marsh, part of which tract had been given to his father, Peter Corson, by the will of Peter's father, Jacob, and strengthened by deed from his brother, Jacob, Jr., Oct. 16, 1756, the remaining part having been purchased by Elias' father from Jacob Spicer's executors. The part of this 147-acre tract, given to Peter Corson, deceased, by will was part of the original 300 acres conveyed to John Corson, the first, by the West Jersey Society by deed of Apr. 23, 1695. On this part of the 147 acres, old Cellar Creek runs through, along which it is said that John and Peter spent their first winter in Cape May County in a cave and when the waters came up in the spring it was necessary to move on to higher ground. This 147-acre tract was referred to in the will of Elias, dated Sept. 2, 1831, and proved in 1832, as his "Seaside Plantation" bequeathed to son Ezra, where he now lives. He devised to his son, Richard S.: "my homestead & farm & plantation on which I now live." By the will, Ezra and Richard S. were to make cash settlements to their sisters and brother, Elias, Jr. Ezra was sole executor. Elias Corson, Sr., died on Oct. 5, 1832, and is buried in the M. E. Churchyard at Petersburg, N. J. Elias, Sr., by his first marriage with Sarah Evans had five children:

By the deeds, made during the settlement of his father's estate, hereinbefore mentioned, Cornelius and Sarah, his wife, and Enoch Young and Deborah Young, his wife, son and daughter, heirs of Peter Corson, conveyed the previously mentioned 147 acres, part of the 300 acres bought by John, I, from the Society, to Jonathan Corson. The consideration was £200 and the deed was dated June 23, 1797. Jonathan did not long keep this tract, as he and Lydia Corson, his wife, son and heir of Peter Corson, for a consideration of \$950, by deed, dated Aug. 9, 1803, conveyed the same 147 acres to Elias Corson. Both of the aforesaid deeds were recorded on Jan. 2, 1804. Jonathan Corson died on Aug. 31, 1848, and Lydia died on Aug. 7, 1856. They had the following children:

1412 MILLICENT CORSON, the daughter of David and Rebecca (Godfrey) Corson, married 2491 Samuel Corson, the son of Jesse and Martha (Somers) Corson. They had eleven children, who are recorded under the history of the father.

1413 ENOS CORSON, listed as the youngest son of David and Rebecca (Godfrey) Corson, married, first, Deborah (Thompson) Edwards, the widow of David Edwards. She had married David Edwards, Jan. 20, 1772. Enos and Deborah had three sons:

14212 HANNAH CORSON, married William Hess, Nov. 2, 1826;

14213 RACHEL CORSON;

14214 HEZEKIAH CORSON, born 1802;

14215 Emley Corson, born 1805;

14216 JOHN CORSON, V, born 1810.

1422 JOEL CORSON was identified from the old manuscript history, compiled by John M. Corson, and loaned to the writer by Charles E. Corson of The Dalles, Oregon, as the son of John and Martha Corson. While he lived the early part of his life in Cape May County, he later moved to Gloucester County, N. J., where he died intestate in 1823. The lineage of this family was not found on the several family trees that have been preserved. From the old manuscript history by John M. Corson, it was established that Joel had one son:

14221 JOEL CORSON, JR.

From information furnished by Dr. J. Clark Corson of Paulsboro, N. J., the history of the descendants of Joel, Jr., was secured. Joel Corson, Jr.'s, full name was Joel Somers Corson, and although nothing definite was found concerning the maiden name of the mother, it may be a good guess that she was a Somers.

1423 ORPHA CORSON was named in the John M. Corson manuscript as the only daughter of John, III, and Martha Corson, the daughter of Jacob and Naomi Corson. Whether she married and left descendants was not disclosed.

1522 JAMES WILLETS, JR., born July 11, 1744, was the second son of James Willets, Sr. He took a very active part in the cause of the colonies in the period preceding and during the Revolutionary War, his name appearing time and time again in the records of this time. He was selected as a member of the County Committee of Safety in 1775, and on Apr. 16, 1777, was made Captain of "the second company of ye Cape May Battalion of militia in the State of New Jersey." The following account of James and his family was taken from the "Journal of Reuben Willets," who was a son of James' youngest brother, Nicholas:

"My grandfather, James Willets, had eight children, Ester, Sally, Rachel, James, Enoch, John, Amos, and Nicholas. The sons all took an active part in the American Revolution, except my father, Nicholas, who was a boy in the times, 'That tried men's souls.' James was a man of considerable wealth and note during the war, but like most of his countrymen, lost an estate by the depreciation of Continental money. He lived many years afterward and I knew him well. James was the oldest of my father's brothers. He was very remarkable for his athletic exploits and muscular powers. The wife of James was the daughter of Nicholas Stillwell, of whom I may have something to say presently. Her name was Rebecca, and during his affluence, their house was famed for its good living and hospitality. Rebecca was a woman of great courage, and withall a great Whig in the War of the Revolution. At one time, while they kept a Public House and Ferry, at what is now Beesleys Point, she was left alone while her husband and all the neighbors were absent on some public occasion at a distance; there was a great quantity of stores left there which had been captured by armed look-out boats, that were fitted out by the people of Cape May. During the day, an armed barge filled with Red Coats was seen to come in the river and row straight for the house (undoubtedly, she was piloted by some refugee, acquainted with the absence of the men). Rebecca watched the approach steadily with a spy-glass, until they were within a half mile of her dwelling. The crisis was a trying one as she doubted not but their objective was plunder. A cannon kept charged and ready for emergencies lay on the river bank near the house; she took a fire brand and pointing well as possible she discharged the gun. The grape shot were seen to fall thickly around the boat; the men fell flat and the boat put about and went to sea. How many were killed or what became of the party remains to this day as profound a secret as the fate of Somers (whose native place was the opposite side of the river) since he entered the harbor of Tripoli. The property, however, and perhaps her life, was saved. Her remains lie buried in the Stillwell burying ground beside the road half a mile south of Beesleys Point. Her husband was buried many years after, I think in 1833, in a family graveyard near where Capt Enoch Wheaton now lives at Tuckahoe."

THE FIFTH GENERATION

THE DESCENDANTS OF PETER AND DEBORAH CORSON

2111 DAVID CORSON is listed as the eldest son of Christian the second. It is very probable that he was the David Corson, who is recorded as taking the Oath of Allegiance, "to the government established in this state, under the authority of the people," on May 27, 1778. David Corson is recorded in his will, dated Mar. 14, 1799, and proved Feb. 25, 1805, as a resident of Middle Township, Cape May County. The fact that he did not live in Upper Township, where the majority of the Corson families lived, not unlikely accounts for his name not appearing on the several family trees of the descendants of John and Peter the first. The name of his wife was not learned; she was not mentioned in his will and had no doubt died previous to the making of same. One son:

21111 DAVID CORSON, JR., died previous to the date of the will, by which the names of his other children were established as follows:

21112 PARMENAS CORSON;

21113 LYDIA CORSON;

- 21114 A DAUGHTER, who was then deceased, but who left sons:
 - 211141 DAVID FERGUSON; and
 - 211142 HENRY FERGUSON.

The eldest son, David, Jr., was identified by his will, proved Apr. 1, 1797.

2112 ABNER CORSON, born June 25, 1729, son of Christian the second, also lived in Middle Township. He was one of the patriots, who took the Oath of Allegiance to the new Colonial government, on May 27, 1778. He married, first, Jane Cresse, born Apr. 9, 1735, whose identity was established from an old memorandum book, the property of Allan Douglas, and also by an old deed, which, since its execution, has been in possession of Abner's descendants and is now owned by Miss Arthelia Jane Mathis, of Ogden, Utah. The connection in the old deed: "This Indenture, made the 26th day of Oct. 1764, between Jacob Spicer Jr., of the County of Cape May in the Province of New Jersey, of the one part, and Jane Corson, late daughter of James Cresse, and present wife of Abner Corson, and Elizabeth Ludlam, late daughter of the said James Cresse, and present wife of Anthony Ludlam, both of the same place, of the other part," etc. The said James Cresse died intestate, and his parents were Arthur Cresse, and his wife, Mercy ______; the said Arthur's parents were Arthur Cresse and his wife, Mary ______. So Jane (Cresse) Corson was the great granddaughter of Arthur Cresse, a pioneer from Long Island to Cape May about 1692, he whom Jeremiah Basse required to send up to the Manor of Coxe Hall, in the name of the West Jersey Society, on the day before each Christmas, "two fat hens or Capons, as a quit Rent."

She was probably a great great granddaughter of the emigrant to Rowley, Mass., William Cresse, who married Ann Haddon, and lived at Stanford, Conn., a brother of Mighill Cresse, emigrant to Rowley, Mass., who lived at Ipswich, Mass. The children of Abner and Jane Corson were born as follows:

21121 CHRISTIAN CORSON, born June 27, 1757;

21122 JUDITH CORSON, born Aug. 8, 1759;

21123 JANE CORSON, born Apr. 10, 1763, died Nov. 23, 1814;

21124 EDITH CORSON, born May 20, 1765;

21125 Abner Corson, Jr., born Nov. 9, 1767;

21126 NATHAN CORSON, born Apr. 8, 1770.

It seems very probable that Abner married, second, Mary Smith, whose marriage is recorded on Apr. 5, 1773. Abner Corson, Sr., died between the date Sept. 22, 1798, when his will was executed, and May 28, 1799, when it was proved. He was evidently a man of some property, the amount of the inventory, made by Phillip Cresse and Stephen Hand, Apr. 10, 1799, totaling \pounds 1,135.0.1.

2113 CHRISTIAN CORSEN, III, is listed as the third son of Christian, II. He probably married Margaret Hildreth and had at least one son:

2113 CHRISTIAN CORSON, JR.,

whose estate was administered May 5, 1829, by Cresse Townsend as assignee.

2114 NATHAN CORSON, listed as the fourth son of Christian, the second, was a bachelor. On page 228, Steven's History of Cape May County, he is said to have been "a man of wealth, who owned what is now the Mount Vernon neighborhood." The statement on the same page that Judith (Corson) Eldredge was a daughter of Nathan Corson is in error as she was the daughter of Abner and Jane (Cresse) Corson, and is so mentioned in Abner's will. An abstract of Nathan's will follows:

64 THREE HUNDRED YEARS WITH THE CORSON FAMILIES

"1799, April 8. Corson, Nathan, of Cape May Co., bachelor; will of. Brother David Corson, all my movable estate. To brother, David Corson's son, Permenas, all my lands. Executors—brother, David, and the above named Parmenas Corson. Witnesses—Thomas Yates, Elizabeth Crawford, and Enoch Scull, Proved Oct. 8, 1804."

2131 RHODA CORSON was probably the eldest child of John, Sr., and Mary (Goff) Corson. She married William Robinson of Cape May County, Aug. 13, 1754. This marriage is found in Marriage Book R, p. 79, at Trenton, N. J. The names on the marriage bond are William Robinson and John Corson, and the witnesses are named as Henry Young and Abraham Van Gilder. William Robinson probably was the widower of Phoebe Young and cousin of Henry Young. From this record it would appear that William Robinson and John Corson lived at this time on the seashore side of Upper Township, Cape May County. That William Robinson and his family some time later immigrated with John Corson's family to the vicinity of the Goff's holdings near the Cape May-Cumberland County border is clearly shown by his (Robinson's) will, dated Jan. 11, 1777, and proved Apr. 15, 1777. His residence was given as Cumberland County. The executors were named as: "friend James Hollinshead and my son, William." Witnesses-Joseph Corson, Levi Crandol, and William Aulis. Mar. 13, 1777, an inventory for £438.6.11 was made by William Aulis and Nathan Youngs. Two years later James Hollinshead was named as executor in the will of Rhoda's father. Toseph Corson was the son of Rhoda's brother, John Corson, Jr. The children of Rhoda (Corson) and William Robinson are identified in his will as follows:

- 21311 WILLIAM ROBINSON, JR., named as "oldest son," married Mary Youngs, both of Maurice River, Cumberland Co., June 20, 1772;
- 21312 RHODA ROBINSON;
- 21313 ENOS ROBINSON, named as "youngest son," was to live with William until he was sixteen years old.

William Robinson's plantation was devised to his sons.

2132 JOHN CORSON, JR., the son of John, Sr., and Mary (Goff) Corson, married a woman of the same maiden name as his mother. At Trenton, my cousin, Alan Corson, found two distinct John Corson and Mary Goff marriage records. The record of the earlier marriage of June 4, 1731, of John Corson and Mary Goff, both of Cape May County, was described under the account of John Corson, Sr. The record of the second marriage, found in Liber C (1735-1764), p. 312, follows: "Bond of John Corson Jr. and Jeremiah Corson, both of Cape May County, Dec. 19, 1761, for marriage of the above named John Corson to Mary Goff of Morris River, Cumberland Co. Witnesses—Henry Young & Mehetabel Godfrey."

Mehetabel Godfrey was the granddaughter of Henry Young. Mary Goff of Maurice River, Cumberland Co., was the daughter of Jeremiah Goff of Maurice River, Cumberland County, and was mentioned in his will, proved July, 1761.

Her brother, Joseph Goff, of Down Township, Cumberland County, in his will, dated Feb. 25, 1777, and proved June 17, 1777, mentions: "my sister Mary Cosen and sister, Hannah Goff,—My brother John is to live with my brother-in-law John Causon till of age." Jeremiah Goff, was probably a grandson of the immigrant to Cape May County, John Goff. Jeremiah Corson was, doubtless, the brother of John Corson, Jr. Although his wife resided in Cumberland County, it seems clear that John Corson, Jr., took his bride to the seashore side of Upper Township to be married, as the witnesses lived near the seacoast. John, Jr., and Mary, after their marriage, probably lived on the north side of Tuckahoe River, in old Gloucester County, now Atlantic County, in the Tarkil or Head of River district, where the boundary lines of the then Gloucester, Cape May and Cumberland Counties verged.

This seems to be verified by the record of John Corson of Gloucester County, whose certificate of military service in the Revolutionary War, as received from John M. Rogers, Lt. Colonel, Deputy Adjutant General of New Jersey, reads as follows:

"It is certified that the records of this office show that John Corson received certificate No. 139, dated May 1, 1784, signed by Thomas Carpenter, for $\pounds 0:13:6$, for the depreciation of his continental pay in the Gloucester County Militia.

"Signed,

FREDERICK GILKYSON, The Adjutant General."

In Stryker's JERSEYMEN IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR, p. 608, is recorded the names of John Goff of Gloucester County and Joseph Goff of Cumberland County. They probably can be safely identified as brothers of Mary (Goff) Corson, the wife of John Corson, Jr. John Goff, who was not of age when his brother died in 1777, as stated heretofore, was to live with his brother-inlaw, John Corson. As will be seen hereinafter, descendants of John Corson, Jr., lived and died in this district. The children of John, Jr., and Mary (Goff) Corson are recorded as follows: 21321 JOSEPH CORSON; 21322 JOHN CORSON.

2133 JEREMIAH CORSON, listed as the third child of John Corson, Sr., and Mary (Goff) Corson, married, Aug. 24, 1763, Mary Creasy (Cresse). His cousin, Job Young, joined him on the marriage bond. (Book C, p. 350, Trenton, N. J.) No record of their children was found. He probably died early in 1788 as an inventory for Jeremiah Corson, deceased, was made May 14, 1788, by Moses Williams and John Goff. Mary Corson was administratrix. She made her mark to the administratrix's bond, also signed by John Goff, Aug. 2, 1791. (Record 770 E, Trenton.) John Goff was probably the brother-in-law of Jeremiah's brother, John Corson, Jr.

2151 ISAAC CORSON, listed as the eldest son of Andrew Corson, evidently was deceased when his father made his will in 1792. The name of his wife was not learned. An item in Aaron Leaming's diary that may be of interest reads as follows: "May and June, 1775. Bloody flux prevailed." Among those listed as dying were: "Isaac Corson, wife and child." Their son,

21511 ISAAC CORSON, JR., survived as he was named in his grandfather's will in 1792.

He may have been the Isaac Corson who married Rachel Corson, Sept. 15, 1816. (Liber B, C. M. C. H.)

2153 ABEL CORSON is listed as the third son of Andrew Corson, of Maurice River Township, Cumberland County. His remarkable record of military service in the Revolutionary War, according to Lewis Reed Corson of Millville, N. J., was certified by William Stryker, Adjutant General, at Trenton, N. J., Feb. 23, 1900, as follows:

"He enlisted as private in the Gloucester Co. Minute Men, November 1776, for the war in Capt. John Hollingshead's Co., Second Battalion, second establishment, New Jersey Continental Line; took part in the Indian Campaign against the six nations from May 11, 1779, to November 5, 1779. Transferred with Company to second New Jersey Continental Line, January 1, 1781—made Fifer in Capt. Hendry's Co., then promoted to Fifer-Major.

"Took part in battle and surrender of Cornwallis, Oct. 19, 1781. Engaged in battles of Millstown, June 7, 1777; Short Hills, N. J., June 26, 1777. Strawberry Hills and Monmouth, N. J., June 28, 1778; Chemung and Newton, N. J., August 28, 1779; Elizabethtown, N. J., June 6, 1780 and Springfield, N. J., June 23, 1780.

"Discharged, June 5, 1783, after six years and seven months of Service."

After the close of the war he married, June 2, 1785, Hannah Royal, a Bridgeton girl, where, it is said, they resided. They were married by Rev. George Faitout of the Greenwich Presbyterian Church. They had two sons:

21531 GEORGE CORSON, born Aug. 14, 1785; 21532 ANDREW CORSON, born Nov. 30, 1789.

2161 PARMENAS CORSON, the eldest son of Joseph the first and Rachel Corson, was born Jan. 23, 1760. On the 16th of Apr., 1777, he with 23 others "did nominate, chose and appoint James Willets, Captain," as well as the other officers of the second company of "ye Cape May Battalion" of militia. During the Revolutionary War he served as a private under the officers he helped to elect. Craig's History of Petersburg says of him: "He was a member of the Governor's Council (now State Senate) in 1796-99; 1801-05; Justice of the Peace, 1796-1801; Freeholder, 1829-32 and 1834." Parmenas Corson married three times. His first wife was 1528 Rachel Willets, daughter of James, whom he married Oct. 26, 1778. She was born Aug. 9, 1762. Two children were born to this union:

21611 Amos Corson, born Aug. 4, 1779; 21612 Anthea Corson, born Feb. 2, 1784.

Rachel (Willets) Corson died July 14, 1801, from a tumor in her back and is buried in the Friends Graveyard at Fifth and Arch Streets, Philadelphia, Pa. Parmenas married, second, Roxanna (Griffing) Benezett, a widow, on Oct. 18, 1804. To them one son was born:

21613 Albert Griffing Corson, born Apr. 23, 1806.

The second wife, Roxanna Corson, died May 17, 1806. The third wife of Parmenas was 2476 Rachel Corson, the daughter of Levi and Margaret (Hand) Corson. They were married Sept. 15, 1816. Rachel Corson was born May 2, 1778, and died on May 1, 1872. Parmenas Corson died Feb. 22, 1843. Parmenas, his second wife, Roxanna, and third wife, Rachel Corson, are buried in the Cemetery of the Second Baptist Church, adjoining the Seaside Cemetery at Palermo, Cape May County.

2162 AMOS CORSON, the second son of Joseph, I, and Rachel Corson, was born on Sept. 30, 1763, and died on Oct. 10, 1763.

2163 JOSEPH CORSON, II, the youngest son of Joseph, I, and Rachel Corson, was born on Sept. 6, 1765. Craig, in his History of Petersburg, says: he "lived on what is known as the Swan Place at the Lower Bridge, and is buried in the Palermo Second Baptist Cemetery. He was appointed Judge of the Inferior Court in 1805, was Justice of the Peace in 1810-11, and conducted a ship-yard at the Lower Bridge." He took the oath as Justice of Peace on Dec. 9, 1803, in 1808 and 1811. By the will of his father, proved in 1793, he was bequeathed many tracts of land, among which was "land at the Saw Scaffle, bought by my grandfather, Peter Corson, from the Society." He married 22:12:4 Phoebe (Mackey) Badcock, the daughter of Elizabeth (Young) and John Mackey, and the widow of Joseph Badcock, who was lost at sea. She was born Aug. 11, 1758, died Sept. 7, 1839, and is buried in the Palermo, N. J., Second Baptist Cemetery. Joseph Corson, II, died on Apr. 7, 1841. Joseph and Phoebe Corson had six children (index numbers not as order of birth):

21631 JOSEPH CORSON, III, born Sept. 1, 1788; 21632 Allen Corson, born Oct. 10, 1790;

21633 SARAH CORSON, married Ezra Young, Aug. 12, 1821;

2284 TABITHA TOWNSEND, born Feb. 7, 1750, the daughter of Tabitha (Young) and John Townsend, married, Jan. 1, 1773, Eli Townsend. He was born Dec. 4, 1746, the son of James and Abeah (Hand) Townsend. They lived in Upper Township, Cape May County, N. J. Their children were:

22841 HANNAH TOWNSEND, married, Sept. 6, 1798, Christopher Leaming.
22842 JAMES TOWNSEND, born 1778, died Apr. 8, 1831;
22843 PRISCILLA TOWNSEND, born Jan. 4, 1782, died Feb. 23, 1807;

22844 Eli Townsend;

22845 Elijah Townsend;

22846 JOHN TOWNSEND.

Eli Townsend, Sr., died May 16, 1796.

2432 DARIUS CORSON, JR., the second son of Darius, Sr., and Hannah (Willets) Corson was born on Sept. 2, 1757. On Apr. 16, 1777, he assisted in the appointment of the officers of the Second Company, Cape May Battalion, under whom he served as a private during the Revolutionary War. On June 6, 1778, he married Martha Mackey and had two sons:

24321 DARIUS CORSON, III; 24322 MACKEY CORSON.

2441 LEWIS CORSON was the eldest son of Rem and Hannah (Stillwell) Corson. He married three times; the first wife

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was Martha Baker, whom he married on Sept. 15, 1790. Lewis and Martha (Baker) Corson had four children:

Lewis Corson married, second, Martha (Mattocks) Townsend, the widow of Thomas Townsend, on June 28, 1801. Martha was the daughter of Robert (born 1717) and Sarah Mattocks. (Robert Mattock's Bible records.) Lewis and Martha (Mattocks) Corson had three children:

24415 MARTHA CORSON, born Feb. 27, 1802; 24416 STILLWELL CORSON, born 1807; 24417 FRANKLIN CORSON.

Lewis Corson married, third, Hannah (Ford) Townsend, the widow of Henry Townsend, and daughter of Dr. Philip Ford. The third marriage was consummated on Mar. 11, 1824. There was no issue of the last union. Lewis lived in Cape May County. He died about the end of the year 1848.

2442 SOPHIA CORSON, born Apr. 22, 1769, was the second child of Rem and Hannah (Stillwell) Corson. On Apr. 25, 1789, she married Uriah Smith, born Oct. 4, 1764, the son of Tuthill and Judith (Gandy) Smith, and the grandson of Rev. Worthington and Mary (Tuthill) Smith. Tuthill Smith is said to have come from England with his brother and settled first on Long Island. Tuthill moved to Cape May County, where he bought a farm in 1746. He married Judith Gandy, of Cape May, in 1748. Sophia (Corson) and Uriah Smith had the following children:

24421 Rem Smith;

24422 SAMUEL G. SMITH, born 1792;

24423 RACHEL SMITH;

24424 SARAH SMITH;

24425 SOPHIA SMITH, married Reuben Godfrey;

24426 URIAH SMITH, married Ann Corson, probably the daughter of Jesse and Ann (Smith) Corson;

24427 RICHARD SMITH, married Tabitha Corson, also probably the daughter of Jesse and Ann (Smith) Corson;

24428 JANE SMITH;

24429 REUBEN SMITH, married Mary Ann Weaver.

Sophia (Corson) Smith died on Nov. 8, 1846, and Uriah Smith, her husband, died Mar. 11, 1843.

2443 AMOS CORSON, the youngest son of Rem and Hannah (Stillwell) Corson, was born about 1780. On Oct. 5, 1812, he

married Mary Garretson, born, according to the 1850 census, in 1794. According to this census Amos and Mary were residents of Middle Township. John M. Corson's manuscript recorded the children of Amos and Mary Corson as follows:

Amos Corson died Aug. 20, 1843, and is buried in the M. E. Church-yard at Petersburg, N. J.

2451 JAMES CORSON, the eldest son of carpenter Peter and Elizabeth (Godfrey) Corson, married, first, Sylva Conover. His second wife was Sylvia Drake, whom he married on Dec. 30, 1802. (F. C. B. & Cape May Mar. Records.) Seemingly they had no children. They lived in Cape May County.

2452 MARY CORSON, listed as the second child of Peter and Elizabeth Corson, married ——— Cox. No record of their children was found.

2453 HENRY CORSON, the third child of Peter and Elizabeth (Godfrey) Corson, married Elizabeth Young, Feb. 21, 1788. They had one son:

24531 HENRY CORSON, JR. (J. M. C. Mss.)

They lived in Cape May County.

2454 CONSTANTINE CORSON, probably the fourth child of Peter and Elizabeth Corson, married Edith Townsend, Nov. 11, 1790. They had two sons:

24541 CONSTANTINE CORSON, JR.; 24542 JAMES CORSON. (J. M. C. MSS.)

They lived in Cape May County, N. J.

2455 ELIZABETH CORSON, listed as the fifth child of Peter and Elizabeth (Godfrey) Corson, was named in her father's will as Elizabeth Bingham.

2456 ELISHEBA CORSON, probably the youngest child of Peter and Elizabeth (Godfrey) Corson, according to the Cape May marriage records, seems to have married John Bingham, Apr. 27, 1801. In her father's will, dated Oct. 7, 1798, she was named Elisheba Corson, so it seems probable that Elisheba also married a Bingham, possibly a brother of her sister's husband.

2471 ABRAHAM CORSON, listed as the eldest son of Levi and Margaret (Hand) Corson, according to the records examined, left no descendants. A notation on Flora Corson Barnes' chart states: "Abram 1st killed in Battle of Germantown." The first Abraham found in the descendants of John and Peter Corson was the son of Levi, but unless he was a son of a marriage previous to his marriage to Margaret Hand, Abraham, the son of Levi, would hardly have been old enough to serve as a soldier in the Revolution.

2472 LOT CORSON, born about 1768, is listed as the second child of Levi and Margaret Hand. He married Elizabeth Smith and had the following children:

If he was the Levi who married Deborah Norton, Dec. 29, 1795, she probably was his second wife, as Thomas, a son of Levi, married in 1807, and no doubt was not born after 1790. In this will he mentions daughters, Elizabeth Ross; Amelia Godfrey; Martha Harmon; Rebecca and Tabitha Corson; and sons, Samuel; and Jesse. The children who were not mentioned, probably died before the father. Amos Townsend was executor and the witnesses were Rem Corson, Amos Corson, Jr., and Tabitha Corson. The Giffins lived on a farm about ten miles above Cincinnati, Ohio, on the Little Miami River in Hamilton County, Ohio. Aquilla and his wife lived in this neighborhood until 1816, when they moved to Columbia, Ohio. They lived there until 1823, then moved to Dearborn County, Indiana, in the neighborhood of Laughery Creek. At that time the roads were bad, and the woods were full of wolves, deer, and wild turkeys. In 1822 droves of squirrels came across the Ohio River, destroying everything before them. At Lawrenceburg, Ind., there is a record that he bought Government land in 1818. Aquilla Corson died at the home of a granddaughter in Kentucky, across the river from Rising Sun, Ind. 12242 EZRA CORSON, born May 5, 1792, was the eldest son of Elias and Sarah (Evans) Corson. He inherited from his father part of the original 300 acres that John, the first, bought of the West Jersey Society in 1695, through which old Cellar Creek runs. It was along the creek that John and Peter are said to have spent their first winter in a cave, after landing in Cape May County from a whale-boat. Ezra Corson married Hannah Steelman, a sister of Abigail Steelman, Ezra's father's second wife, on Mar. 5, 1815. Hannah Steelman was born in 1793. 12245 MARTHA CORSON, a daughter of Elias and Sarah (Evans) Corson was born in 1787 and died in 1869. She married William Boon.

12246 RICHARD S. CORSON, born Jan. 9, 1815, was the eldest son of Elias and his second wife, Abigail (Steelman) Corson. He married Mary Corson, born May 25, 1821, the daughter of John M. and Eliza (Ingersoll) Corson, on Oct. 15, 1836. They were married at the home of her parents by Rev. Mathias Jerman. Richard S. and his family lived in Petersburg, Cape May County, N. J., for ten years, the husband and father farming part of the time and going to sea the rest of the time. In the spring of 1845 he went to Illinois and worked on a farm north of Pleasant Plains, Ill., to see how he liked the country. The Illinois prairies appealed to him so well that he rented a farm and sowed fall wheat, then bought a horse and went back to New Jersey on horseback. In the spring he returned to Illinois with his wife and five children. The trip from New Jersey was made by water except from Philadelphia to Pittsburgh. From thence by the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers to St. Louis, then up the Illinois River to Beardstown, and from there to Pleasant Plains. They lived for five years near Richland, Sangamon County, Ill., then in the fall of 1850 he bought some land about five miles southeast of Pleasant Plains, Ill., and built a home on it. The family moved into the new home on Feb. 26, 1851, and here the parents lived the remainder of their They lived to celebrate their 65th wedding anniversary on lives. Oct. 16, 1901. (From information from Fannie E. Corson of New Berlin, Ill., and Nellie R. (Corson) Soderburg of Dwight, Kan.)



By his will, dated Nov. 20, 1796, and proved Apr. 1, 1797, eight years before the will of his father was proved, he provided as follows: Father David Corson, all my cattle and mare; also money and clothing and all my estate. Executors father, David. Witnesses—Parmenas Corson, Jr., and James Godfrey. On May 26, 1797, the inventory for £104.4.0 was made by Jesse Corson and Cornelius Corson. David probably lived in Middle Township.

21112 PARMENAS CORSON is listed as the second son of David, the son of Christian, the second. He probably married, first, Priscilla Cresse, Nov. 1, 1774. This marriage is recorded in marriage Book C, p. 565, at Trenton, N. J. The bondsman was John Godju, and the witnesses were Joseph Savage and Sarah Stillwell. He married, second, Lydia ———, who renounced her right to administer her deceased husband's estate on Feb. 27, 1822. William Learning became administrator on Mar. 5, 1822. (File C, p. 304, Cape May Court House, N. J.) The administrator sold various tracts of real estate. From the will of the sister of Parmenas Corson, Lydia Corson, it was established that Parmenas was survived by at least one child:

Parmenas Corson, it seems, lived in Middle Township, Cape May County, N. J.

21113 LYDIA CORSON was the daughter of David, the son of Christian, II. It seems very clear from the records that she did not marry. 21121 CHRISTIAN CORSON[†], III, was the eldest son of Abner and Jane (Cresse) Corson. He was the rich bachelor, who died intestate, Dec. 5, 1821. He lived in Middle Township, Cape May County. He was born June 27, 1757.

21122 JUDITH CORSON, the second child of Abner and Jane (Cresse) Corson was born Aug. 8, 1759. On Dec. 10, 1778, she married William Eldredge, who was born Nov. 1, 1759, and who served in the State Council or Senate during the term 1805-06. The descendants of Judith and William Eldredge are numerous in Cape May County and include the descendants of John Mecray, who, Apr. 2, 1805, married Hannah Eldredge, a daughter of William and Judith.

21123 JANE CORSON, born Apr. 10, 1763, the third child of Abner and Jane (Cresse) Corson, married Benjamin Orum and had three children. They were named in the will of their grandfather, Abner Corson, Sr., as follows:

21125 ABNER CORSON, JR., born Nov. 9, 1767, the fifth child of Abner, Sr., and Jane (Cresse) Corson, married Margaret Buck, a daughter of Aaron Buck—a Patriot of the Revolution, whose house was spared at the burning of Tom's River, by the British, on Sunday, Mar. 24, 1782—and his wife, Margaret Dillon, a daughter of James Dillon, a Patriot and officer in the Revolution. They lived in Middle Township, Cape May County. To Abner, Jr., and Margaret Corson the following children were born:

21321 JOSEPH CORSON is listed as the eldest son of John Corson, Jr., who married Mary Goff, of Cumberland County, Dec. 19, 1761. He probably was born in the following year. While not much is known about his early life, he apparently lived near the home of his father, which seems to have been on the north side of the Tuckahoe River in old Gloucester County, near Tarkil or Head of River. Tarkil was in old Gloucester County, near the former border line of Cape May and Cumberland Counties. Old Gloucester County is now Atlantic County. The border lines of these counties have been changed from time to time, so that some of the plantations of the early settlers in the borderline districts were first in one county and then in another. On Mar. 14, 1844, the eastern corner of Maurice River Township, which at that time was in Cumberland County, was set off to Cape May County; it was reannexed to Cumberland, Feb. 26, 1845, and again set off to Cape May, Mar. 26, 1878. On Jan. 11, 1777, Joseph Corson witnessed the will of William Robinson, the husband of his father's sister. On June 14, 1779, he witnessed the signature of James Hollingshead, when the latter found it necessary to renounce as executor for John Corson, Sr., deceased, Joseph's grandfather.

From the family Bible of Mrs. Esther (Peacock) Gordon, it was established that the wife of Joseph was named Barbara. The names of her parents were not learned. Mrs. Esther (Peacock) Gordon was the granddaughter of Prudence (English) Peacock, whose second and third husbands (John Corson and Joseph Corson) were sons of Joseph and Barbara. Joseph and Barbara had the following children:

He is listed on the Champion Corson "tree" as a son of John Corson, Jr., or II, and Flora Corson Barnes records his wife as Bessie ———. Her maiden name was not learned. John Townsend was the eighth child of Henry Young Townsend and his second wife, Edith (Stites) Swain, the widow of Daniel Swain. Henry Young Townsend (born 1744, died May 13, 1789) was the second child and eldest son of John Townsend and his second wife, Tabitha (Young) Townsend, the daughter of Henry and Abigail Young. Henry Young was the progenitor of the Young family in Cape May County, and was there as early as 1713. John Townsend (born Oct. 29, 1706, died Sept. 23, 1785), the father of Henry Young Townsend, was the second child of Richard and Millicent (Somers) Townsend. John's first wife was Sarah Champion. Millicent Somers (born Dec., 1685, died Apr. 20, 1782) was the daughter of John Somers, who came to Somer's Point from Long Island in 1695. John Somers (born Apr. 30, 1648, and died Dec. 19, 1723) was the first ancestor of the Somers family in Cape May County. Richard Townsend, said to have been the first white child born in Cape May County (born Dec., 1681, died May 3, 1737), was the son of John Townsend, ancestor of all of the name in Cape May County, who came to Leed's Point, near Little Egg Harbor, in 1680 from Long Island, whence he was banished for harboring Quakers.



He married Eliza Ingersoll, who was born at Tuckahoe, N. J., on Dec. 16, 1799. She was the daughter of John Ingersoll (1763-1838) and Mary Champion (1764-1837). License for this marriage was issued Feb. 12, 1819. (Gloucester Co. Records.) They lived at Petersburg, Upper Township, until their children were about grown. In the fall of 1846, John M. Corson moved his family to Illinois, following his daughter, Mary, and her husband, Richard S. Corson, who had preceded them to Illinois in the spring of the same year.

John Mackey Corson probably compiled the first history of the Cape May Corson families, having written a ten-page manuscript history of the early generations that recorded not only quite a few of the descendants of John and Peter Corson, but also many intermarriages, in which both of the contracting parties were identified. It is now owned by his grandson, Charles E. Corson, of The Dalles, Oregon, and he very kindly loaned it to the compiler. It was very helpful in straightening out some of the errors that had crept into the charts or family trees. This manuscript was written probably not long after 1860-65.



A piece of his scalp as big as a saucer was fastened by only about two inches of flesh. When the doctor was dressing his wound he held a mirror so that Asail (Ace) could see his skull bone. Upon arriving home he fainted, but the next day was able to vote for his beloved leader. He was to be made a Captain when he returned to his company, but his wound was so long in healing that he could not return. At Jacksonville, Morgan County, Ill., Nov. 16, 1865, he married Ellen Elizabeth Cole, the ceremony being performed by the Rev. Henry Wallace. He married, Dec. 4, 1822, Abigail Hand, the daughter of Stephen and Laodicea (Isard) Hand of Cape May County. Concerning him, his granddaughter, Mrs. Bertha Ashbrook, of Springfield, Ill., said: "Grandfather Nathan was a 'shouting Methodist' —one who works at his religion." "A licensed exhorter and class leader." Although his parents were Baptists, Mrs. Ashbrook said: "All his children lived and died in the Methodist faith." Seven children were born to Nathan and Abigail Corson as follows:

About 1849, when he was 46 years old, Nathan and his family moved, in a migration of several Cape May families, to Richland, Sangamon County, Ill., to what was then called the "West." There he lived until his death, Nov. 14, 1883. He is buried in the Bethel Churchyard beside his beloved Abigail, who died Sept. 20, 1887, aged 84 years 19 days. All the children, except Emma, grew to maturity and moved with their parents to Richland, Ill.

211254 JOHN CORSON, the son of Abner, Jr., and Margaret Buck Corson, died previous to Feb. 15, 1825. On that date his inventory was made by Henry Hand and Spicer Hughs. Jennings G. Mathis, his brother-in-law, was made administrator. (Record 1022-E. Trenton.) Part of his estate was a legacy from the estate of his uncle, 21121 Christian Corson, valued at \$800.

211255 JANE CORSON, probably the fifth child of Abner, Jr., and Margaret (Buck) Corson, was born in Cape May County, Aug. 19, 1807. She married, Sept. 28, 1823, Jennings Gaskill Mathis, who was born at Little Egg Harbor, Aug. 1, 1800, a son of John Mathis and his wife, Martha (Crammer) Mathis. She lived in Cape May County until 1854, when she and her family joined in the migration of Cape May families to the "West," and moved to Philadelphia, Ill., where she lived until her death, Dec. 17, 1878; she is buried in the Bethel Churchyard (Methodist) one and one-half miles northwest of Pleasant Plains, Ill. She was a niece of the rich bachelor, Christian Corson, who died intestate, Cape May County, Dec. 5, 1821, and as such was an inheritor of her part of her deceased father's share of this estate. Miss Arthelia Jane Mathis of Ogden, Utah, who furnished the history of her

line from Abner, Sr., and Jane (Cresse) Corson, has written the following concerning her grandmother, Jane Corson (Mathis): "She was a motherly, hospitable, and lovable woman, and, with her large blue eyes, and fine curling hair, and aristocratic bearing, she was representative of her early Manhattan ancestry. She lived in Illinois, on a fine farm, with large apple orchards, in a three-story house of the New England Colonial style, which was set in a grove of black locust, walnut, and hard maple trees. There she was the patron-saint of her grandchildren. Her pewter candlestick and her black lace shawl are now owned by her granddaughter, Mrs. Margaret Foster (Smith) of Merrill, Wis.; her four poster and her thumb-print glass bon bon dish are now the much-prized possessions of her great granddaughter, Miss Danna Kelly, of Ogden, Utah; and her Sheraton bureau is in the keeping of her great granddaughter, Miss Alice Mathis, of Jacksonville, Ill.

Jane Corson (Mathis) and her husband, Jennings Gaskill Mathis, had seven children, all born in Cape May, N. J. They were:

He married Kesia Bradford, Jan. 19, 1827; the ceremony was performed by the Rev. Israel Townsend. Kesia Bradford was born in Cape May County, Jan. 25, 1810. Robert Corson was a sea captain. The family was recorded as residents of Middle Township in the 1850 census. According to the family register of their old Bible, a copy of which was furnished by Miss Lila M. Gandy, of Ocean View, N. J., they had the following children:

On Nov. 26, 1803, he married Prudence (English) Peacock, the widow of Samuel Peacock, a shoemaker by trade, a Godly man highly respected in the community, a local preacher in the Methodist Church. She was the daughter of Mizeal and Elizabeth English of Great Egg Harbor. Mizeal was born in 1755 and died Nov., 1839, aged 84 years; Elizabeth died May 4, 1805. It is not known whether John and Prudence lived in old Gloucester or in Cape May County. John died Oct. 20, 1804, and Prudence was again a widow. In Dec., 1804, or Jan., 1805, posthumous twins were born to Prudence. They were named:

They were married by Justice of the Peace, David Goff, who is said to have lived near Goshen, on the Delaware Bay side of Cape May County. Prudence (English) (Peacock) (Corson) (Corson) later (Dilks) was a somewhat unusual personality. She was the daughter of Mizeal and Elizabeth English of Great Egg Harbor, Gloucester County. She was born Feb. 8, 1784; died Mar. 7, 1847. She was stricken with apoplexy when making a speech in a Methodist class meeting at Glassboro and died the following morning. She first married Samuel Peacock, a widower with three children, who had buried three wives. He was born June 18, 1764; died Oct. 18, 1802, aged 38 years 4 months. There was one son of this marriage, Samuel, Jr., born Aug. 27, 1802; died Aug. 12, 1877.

Samuel Peacock, Sr., was a very devout Christian. He was a local preacher and greatly respected in the community. Prudence married him before she was eighteen years of age. His proposal of marriage, still extant, reads in part:

.... "Although I have not had personal acquaintance with you and have only seen you a few times, yet believing and hoping you to be a person possest of real Religion and having the Grace of God reigning in your soul, this makes me so bold as to send these few lines only humbly to inquire without dissimulation or flattery-although I know that flattery is greatful to every listening ear-whether you have any mind to change your station in life or not, and simply to ask whether you would permit such a man as myself to come and converse with you seriously on that subject. In my youth my feelings would not let me keep company with the fair sex on any other subject and now my years, my profession, and my station in life entirely forbid it. Therefore if you have no such mind but still prefer a single life, I humbly beg that you will not take this amiss or as an affront to you, but that you would freely answer me as plain and as simply as I have asked and as Christianity requireth yea or nay-for I solemnly tell you that I desire that my yea might be yea and my nay might be nay, knowing from the sacred oracles that anything more than this cometh of evil. This from your well wisher and brother in tribulation in the kingdom and patience of Jesus etc., etc. SAMUEL PEACOCK

P.S. You can send such an answer by your Aunt Sallie either verbal or written as you shall think best and proper with such secrecy as you please. Your compliance with this humble request will greatly oblige yours, etc. The reason I said secrecy is because there are so many peering eyes watching me insomuch that I am almost afraid to set foot toward such an attempt upon uncertainties.

Prudence English married Samuel Peacock, July 31, 1801. He died Oct. 18, 1802. Prudence (English) Peacock married John Corson, Nov. 26, 1803. He died Oct. 20, 1804, aged 23 years 7 months 3 days. Late in 1804 or early in 1805, posthumous twins were born of this union: John and Rhoda. Her third marriage was to Joseph Corson as heretofore mentioned. Her fourth marriage, after a widowhood of thirteen years, was to Chester Dilks, of Glassboro, Aug. 25, 1837. Her name in the Gloucester County records was spelled Prudence Causdon.

Joseph and Prudence, it seems, lived first at Maurice River, Cumberland County, where their first child was born. The other children were born at Glassboro, N. J., where, presumably, the family had moved. Joseph, probably, was engaged in the business of glass manufacturing, as a glass-house had been established at Glassboro. Several years before this work was undertaken, my cousin, Alan Corson, of Philadelphia, through the courtesy of Miss Sarah Corson, had made photographic copies of these deeds, and he presented a copy of each deed to the compiler. A complete transcription of the deed to John is given heretofore in this volume. During the summer of 1931, while gathering data for this work, the writer was advised by Mrs. Massey that her sister, Sarah, was then a helpless invalid, living with her at her home in East Orange. Mr. and Mrs. Corson have never directed attention to getting rich but have aimed through life to be a betterment to mankind; they are always found on the side of right; are active members of the M. E. Church, and of society, and are among the best and most highly respected people of the community." Reuben died in 1918; Rachel in 1923.

Here in Illinois, on a fine farm, he lived with his mother for two years, in their fine three-story New England Colonial style home, set in a grove of black locust, walnut and hard maple trees. He married in 1856 and his daughter, Miss Arthelia Jane Mathis, has written the following concerning him: "To this colonial house, John, the handsome and dignified son of Jane Corson & Jennings Gaskill Mathis, took his bride, St. Helena (who was the daughter of Henry Hand and his second wife, Arthelia Hewitt, of Cape May) and from their marriage, Dec. 18, 1856, to the end of their long lives it was their home. It was a proud and happy time for John and St. Helena when they went west to tame the Illinois prairies. They were good lovers and good pioneers; John's best suit was a black broadcloth swallow-tail, which he wore over a white Marseilles waistcoat, cut away to show a broad expanse of muchtucked, much-starched, and much-buttoned shirt front of linen, dazzling white, over which was draped a flowing neckerchief of soft black silk; his headpiece was a stove-pipe of black beaver.

The bride's gown was a rich silk of olive and black moire, with undersleeves of hand-embroidered fine cream mull. Her bonnet was crimson lyon's velvet, self-trimmed, and the bow under her chin was edged with narrow black silk lace. Her shawl was cream silk, with a deep Persian border in violet and scarlet; she wore black silk mits, and a brooch that was hung top and bottom, on a pivot, in its gold frame, so that it could be worn either side out. She carried a purse that was made of tiny French beads in many colors; her parasol was brown silk with ivory handle, and her fan, which was an heirloom, was of brown and tan feathers. He was a thrifty man (John was) being industrious and versatile; he could with equal ease plow a straight furrow in a 40-acre field; execute a manuscript in a beautiful hand, with a quill pen; fashion a bob-sled; sing a hymn; dig a well; say grace at the table; shoe a horse; and dress the baby before breakfast. He was a good son, a good husband, and a good father, kind and courteous at all times.

He loved his Illinois farm; but he did yearn, sometimes, for the fleshpots of Cape May—the oysters, blue fish, and eels—when in bondage to the chicken pot-pies of Illinois, and the fat wild geese which his trusty aim brought low. St. Helena was a capable and cheerful companion and help-meet; she could, at the end of a perfect day of housework, after the farm supper was eaten, and the dishes cleared away, knit a man's sock, from toe to top, by eleven o'clock."

Neither had they any literary needs; for was not the old chest, which smelled of dried peaches, plum full? 'The Prairie Flower' for the romantic; 'Sinbod the Sailor' for the adventurous; and the grey Bible, with the Apocrypha, for the pious. This attic also contributed to their taste for music, with its dulcimer, which one was at liberty to play, while the other two played the accompaniments with the spinningwheel and the sausage grinder. Were any of them pugilistic? There was a constant challenge to tilt with the old coats, the bags of sage and hops, and the hoop-skirts, which swung from the rafters; and if any keen ears heard the bears coming, one child would scale the steps, which led to a trap-door in the house roof, one would hide in the recess of a dormer window, while the third scuttled, on hands and knees, behind a brass-bound chest, made of bull hide, with the red hair on, which was so fierce in itself that it was the safest place of all."

During the eventful military career of Colonel Gandy he saw much military service, and his recollections concerning many incidents of his service are very interesting. The following was related by Colonel Gandy on Christmas Day, 1931: "Forty years ago today, my Christmas dinner consisted of bacon and hard tack sandwiches out of my saddle pocket, coffee, and a little strawberry preserves, that one of the officers had bought at a small trading store a day or two before, and we were mighty glad to get it. You may remember that the winter of 90-91 saw the last serious Indian outbreak with the Sioux on the war path. I (then a Capt. and Assistant Surgeon) was attached to the sixth cavalry and on Christmas day was with a squadron of this organization, scouting in the "Bad Lands" of the Dakotas riding thirty miles a day and sleeping on the ground. We were endeavoring to prevent Chief Big Foot and his ghost dancers from coming through a pass and joining other hostile bands.

About this time the eighth cavalry to the north of us intercepted Big Foot's band and reported his capture. We were ordered to join the main command at the Pine Ridge Agency and started to do so. The wily Indian, however, succeeded in making his escape

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
from the eighth cavalry and came through the territory at the point we had been guarding, but after our retirement. He was again rounded up by the seventh cavalry, before we reached the main command. During the attempt to disarm this band after they had nominally surrendered, the Indians, with arms concealed under their blankets, opened fire on the soldiers and a fight occurred which resulted in the killing of one officer, Capt. Wallace, and wounding others. A few soldiers were killed and others wounded and the Indians suffered a heavy loss before they finally surrendered their arms and themselves.

The squadron to which I was attached had not yet joined the main command, when a Cheyenne courier reached us at midnight with an account of the engagement and further orders to proceed to General Miles Camp near Pine Ridge Agency. We started to obey these orders but before we could rejoin the rest of the regiment a terrific blizzard lasting several days over took us. New Year's day, 1891, dawned bright and clear with everything covered with a heavy snow. Early in the forenoon we heard firing and "boots and saddles" was sounded. As we were ready to start a courier reached us with a message to the effect that a detached troop of the regiment had been attacked by another band of hostile Sioux and were on the defensive on Little Dry Grass Creek, some five or six miles away.

Our ride to the rescue was nominally at the gallop, but progress was naturally impeded by the heavy snow. We arrived at about the same time as another squadron of the regiment and found the troop dismounted and fighting on the defensive. The superior range of the cavalry carbines over the Indians' weapons had enabled them to hold off the greater numbers of redskins without loss of men. The two rescuing squadrons crossed the river deployed and began the fight on foot. After a short skirmish the Indians, now outnumbered, retreated, taking with them any dead or wounded. The troops suffered no casualties. Lieutenant, afterward Major General, Robert L. Howz was with the beseiged troop and 2nd Lieut. John J. Pershing was a member of the rescuing party.

Colonel Gandy is now living at Ocean View, Cape May County, N. J., the place of his birth, with his wife and daughter.





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outstanding educational projects, including all-year schools. The system of all-year schools in Newark consisted of high, junior high, elementary and special schools, particularly the School for Crippled Children. After some years of experiment he became convinced that the all-year plan was excessively expensive, especially in view of the unsatisfactory results obtained, and courageously recommended its discontinuance. After six years of further trial the plan was abandoned, but not until the expense had become prohibitive. He named and extended the Binet Schools and centers for defective children and established sight conservation classes. He encouraged and developed all types of classes for handicapped children. He caused the establishment of the first evening high school in New Jersey on a par with day high schools in admission requirements, in length of term, curricula and value of diploma.

He introduced into elementary schools classification of pupils according to ability and what is known as the Intensive Plan of teaching the Manual Arts. He recommended and caused to be established the first junior college east of the Allegheny Mountains, the first on exact par in curricula, faculty, work, and standing for freshman and sophomore years with the old established colleges of arts and sciences. This college after several years of unquestioned success was abolished because of expense, the claim being made by the authorities that collegiate education should not be given at public expense.

He was a member of a committee of national educators appointed in 1924 to make a survey of the public schools of New York City. He was a member of a committee appointed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in U. S. A., of which Dr. W. O. Thompson, President of the Ohio State University, was chairman, to survey the theological seminaries of the Presbyterian Church. The reports have been published. Doctor Corson was vice-president of the National Department of Superintendents of the N. E. A., a member of the National Council, president of the New Jersey Council of Education, president of the Newark Principals' Association, president of the Presbyterian Union of Newark, and president of the New York Schoolmasters' Club. He was also a member of the Scholia Club of Columbia University. He is a textbook author and author of various public reports and addresses. He was a college lecturer and public speaker at educational meetings and conventions. Doctor Corson married Kate Thompson, the daughter of Joseph and Mary Thompson, Nov. 21, 1893, at Rahway, N. J. THE CORSONS OF DUMFRIESSHIRE, SCOTLAND

The Corsons in America descended from the Dumfriesshire, Scotland, group, while probably less numerous than any of the other groups, seem to be the only families whose ancestors used the name as a family name before coming to America. The progenitor of this group is said to have been an Italian named Corsani or Corsini, brought to Scotland by Dervorguila, the queen of John De Baliol, King of Scotland, from 1292 to 1296. She was the daughter of Alan, Earl of Galloway. Queen Dervorguila was very devoted to her husband and after his death had his heart embalmed and always carried it with her in a little silver casket. To his memory she then built Sweetheart Abbey or "Dulce Cor" as it was then called and after her death she was buried under its altar with the silver casket on her bosom. Sweetheart Abbey is now a beautiful ruin in good preservation near Dumfries, Scotland. The Corsons of Dumfriesshire have spelled their name "Corson" or "Corsan." A characteristic of the Scottish Corson families is "brown eyes and very dark hair."

The story of the origin of this family was published in the 1922 publication of the Gallovidian Annual, published by Robert Dinwiddle, Dumfries, Scotland, under the caption THE CORSANES OF MEIKLE KNOX, AN OLD DUMFRIES FAMILY. It was compiled from Nisbet's "Heraldry," the manuscript of George Corsane Cunningham, and Edgar's History of Dumfries, and edited by R. C. Reid, a descendant of the family. The Gallovidian said in part:

"Tradition asserts that this family is descended from an Italian named Corsini, reputed to be of the many artisans of skill brought from the Continent by Dervorguila to build Sweetheart Abbey. From the original prefix, "A" or "AP," occurring as a routine in old writs, some authorities question this origin, considering the name to be Celtic and of Galloway origin. The story of the early Scottish and Galloway connection is well brought out by such compilations of State papers as Bain's 'Calendar of Documents,' "The Exchequer Rolls,' 'Papal Petitions,' etc., to which we make one or two references:

"1296-Robert de Carson, persone (parson) of Kirkcandres (Kirkandrews) Church, figures in the 'Ragmans Roll.'

"1305—John Akarson, scutifer (literally, a shield-bearer), with other Galloway and Dumfriesshire men, was present at the successful assault on

the Castle of Dumfries, garrisoned by Bruce's followers, after the death of Comyn.

"1400—Sir Alexander Corsane witnessed a charter of Archibald the Grim to Sir John Stewart of the lands of Calie (Cally) Kirkcudbrightshire.

"1408—Dominus Thomas Corsanus was perpetual Vicar of Dumfries. (Several of the old references show an ecclesiastical standing.)

"1464—John A'Corsone had sasine (possession) of the lands of Gaitgilmakkilwernock (Gaitgill M'Ilvernock) in Borgue.

"1503—Andro Akersane was granted a respite for burning the Place of Dunskay.

"According to Nisbet, the founder of the Dumfries family was Sir Robert Corsane of Skyreburn and Glen-skyreburn (Rusco), but this reputed origin cannot be established. There is, however, a very interesting Galloway relationship through the marriage of his two daughters, Marion and Janet. Marion, the elder, inheriting the property, married Sir Robert Gordon, son of Sir John Gordon of Lochinvar, who assumed the designation of Glen until the death of his brother, Sir Alexander, who fell at Flodden, when he succeeded to that of Lochinvar. From this union sprang the barons of that ilk, and the Lords of Kenmuir. The younger daughter, Janet, married Edward Maxwell of Hills, Lochrutten, their arms being quartered on the Castle walls. A very noteworthy point in the family history insisted upon by tradition, and quoted by Nisbet, is that there was 'a lineal succession of male heirs for eighteen generations, and they were all of the name of 'John.'

"With this introduction we can now pass to the details of the Dumfries branch proper, with which we are more intimately concerned. Probably the earliest mention of the family takes us back to June 30, 1367, when Maurice and Gilbert Acrassane served on an Assize at Dumfries. Then follows a pause extending to 1477, when there is an available statement that 'Patrick Corsane, burgess, was in possession of a tenement in Dumfries,' a definite note of genealogical basis. It would indeed have been of supreme interest to have followed consecutively the individual histories of the 'eighteen Johns,' but of the first ten we have no record at all. We are, however, able with some degree of confidence to commence an authentic account with John Corsane (the eleventh), who was either the son or grandson of Patrick Corsane, just mentioned. This John Corsane was a burgess in Dumfries in 1520.

"John Corsane (the twelfth). Now on more substantial ground, we learn that this twelfth John (1537-1580) married ——— Brown, daughter of James Brown and Marion Newall. John Corsane (the thirteenth), 1553-1629, was prominent in office, holding the municipal positions of Bailie, Treasurer, and Provost, of Dumfries, while in Parliament, he represented the Burgh from 1617 to 1621. He married Isobel Maxwell, daughter of the seventh Lord Maxwell (slain at Dryfe Sands) and sister of Robert, eighth Lord Maxwell, and first Earl of Nithsdale, who was beheaded at Edinburgh for the treacherous shooting of Sir James Johnstone on sixth April, 1608. (Legend of the 'Bloodstone,' etc., omitted.)

"Reverting to the career of John Corsane (the thirteenth), it may be noted that he was reputed to be one of the richest commoners of the day. Besides the property of Meikle Knox in Kirkcudbright, he was an extensive owner of house property in the town of Dumfries itself. He died in 1629, when his eldest son, John the fourteenth, raised to his memory a handsome memorial in St. Michael's Churchyard. This monument is situated by the entrance gate, with its back to the street. It is an imposing structure, with fluted pilasters on either side of an entral panel. Decay, however, has worked some havoc with the stone, which is soft in character. (Copy of inscriptions, etc., on monument omitted.)

"One daughter born to John Corsane and Isobel Maxwell became the Maxwelton. merchant of Dumfries. John Corsane (XIV) also had a dismother of 'Bonnie Annie Laurie' by her marriage to Stephen Laurie of tinguished career. A graduate of Edinburgh University, he became an Advocate in 1613, Sheriff Depute and M. P. of Dumfries in 1633 and Provost from 1637 to 1644. He succeeded to the property of Meikle Knox, and married Margaret, daughter and co-heiress of Robert Maxwell of Dinwoodic and Cowhill, a cadet of the Maxwells of Nithdale, descended from Robert, second son of the Master of Maxwell, son of the third Lord Maxwell (Descriptions of various activities of John XIV omitted.)

"John Corsane (XV), born in 1621, also held the municipal position of a Bailie of Dumfries. He married Jean Kirkpatrick of Closeburn. John Corsane (XVI), his son, married Marion Maxwell of Tinwald, and was succeeded by his son, John Corsane (XVII), who died in 1717. To his wife, Agnes Crosbie, was born a son, not many months after his father's death. This child, John Corsane (XVIII), the last male heir by lineal descent, unfortunately died in February, 1721. The estate then passed to Agnes, his father's sister, the wife of Rev. Peter Rae, Minister of Kirkbride, Dumfriesshire. The marriage took place on July 19, 1697. Twelve children were born to Peter and Agnes Rae, and by 'special destination' in 1731, with the consent of her husband, it was arranged that 'the eldest son of Agnes Corsane or Rae' should assume the name Corsane, and the arms of the family of Meikle Knox.

"Trace now this connection from the 'Spindle' side and we find that Robert Corsane, son of Peter Rae and Agnes Corsane, married Agnes, daughter of Alexander M'Gown or M'Gowan, described as a W.S. of Edinburgh, otherwise as a 'Bailie' of Dumfries. Of a family of seventeen only seven survived, a son and six daughters. The son, Robert, an ensign in the Royal Scots, seems to have died at Gibraltar (1776). From the eldest daughter, Janet, a more than interesting Galloway connection arose by her marriage with David McCulloch of Ardwall, the friend of Robert Burns. Their son, James Murray M'Culloch, was the father of Walter M'Culloch and his two sisters, Agnes and Janet. Janet married G. G. Brown, Esq., of Lochanhead, and they became the parents of the well-known trio of Galloway Ladies, Lady Ardwall, Mrs. Cliff M'Culloch, and Mrs. Stewart of Shambellie.

"From the youngest daughter of Robert Corsane and Agnes M'Gown, Margaret, are descended the Threshie Reids, represented by Lord Loreburn and R. C. Reid, Esq., Editor of Edgar's History of Dumfries."

THE CORSONS OF THE MARR

The Marr Farm is an old Corsan or Corson stronghold on the River Nith. The Corsans of the Marr have occupied this farm

for many generations and are living there today. Mrs. Margaret Corsan (Millar) Doty of Elyria, Ohio, a descendant of this family, says, although the exact line of descent has not been established, it is her opinion that the Corsans of the Marr are descended from John, the thirteenth or fourteenth. The line has been traced to George Corsan, who had two sons, George and Thomas, and a daughter, Janet Corsan, who married James Dalziel. Sir Kennedy Dalziel, the famous surgeon, was the great grandnephew of James Dalziel.

GEORGE CORSAN, the eldest son, succeeded his father and lived at the Marr. He had two sons, William and Thomas. William Corsan, the eldest son, succeeded his father, George, to the Marr Farm and married his cousin, Agnes Corsan, the daughter of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan. Their descendants still live there. They had two sons, Thomas and George; the latter lived at Dalbeattie.

THOMAS CORSAN, the younger son of George of the Marr, lived at Mennock Mill. He had a son, Dr. John Corsan, who moved to Canada, but was killed in a railroad accident while in Scotland visiting relatives. Dr. John Corsan had a son, Dr. Douglas Corsan, who lived at Woodstock, Ontario, Canada, and a daughter, Isabelle Corsan, a very beautiful woman, who married —————.

THOMAS CORSAN, the younger son of George Corsan of the Marr, was born about 1744. As his elder brother, George, succeeded his father to the Marr farm, Thomas had to find another place. He moved to a nice farm called the Humbie and married Agnes Kennedy, the daughter of William and Agnes (Gracie) Kennedy. Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan had nine children as follows: Jeanie, William, Agnes, Thomas, George, James, Ebenezer, John, Margaret.

JEANIE CORSAN, the eldest daughter of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, married Mr. Telfer.

WILLIAM CORSAN, the son of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corson, died unmarried.

AGNES CORSAN, the daughter of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, married her cousin, William Corsan, the son of George Corsan of the Marr. THOMAS CORSAN, the son of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, married Mary Haining. They lived on the Humbie after his father retired and moved to Sanquhar, Scotland, where he had built a home.

GEORGE CORSAN, the son of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, became, first, a minister and later was made rector of Irvine Academy, a famous school at that time. The name of his wife was not learned. He had four children: Thomas; George; Jeanie; Elizabeth, who died unmarried.

THOMAS CORSAN, the son of George Corsan and grandson of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, was born at Irving (near Glasgow) Scotland. He moved to Toronto, Ontario, Canada, where he became the manager of a bank. He married a Miss Hebden of New York City. They had three children: Prof. George Hedden Corsan, the expert swimmer and originator of the Australian crawl or Corsan stroke, who had a son, Capt. George Corsan, also an expert swimmer and aviator in the World War; Janet Corsan, who is head mistress of a school near London, England; Kate Corsan, who married a Mr. Hotchkin of Southampton, England. Thomas Corsan, the father, died in 1905, at Toronto, Canada.

JAMES CORSAN, the son of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, was born in Scotland, emigrated to Canada and settled near Woodstock, Ontario. He married Elizabeth Nesbit, when living in Glasgow, Scotland, and they had two children: James Corsan, who farmed in Canada and died without issue; Elizabeth Corsan, who married Doctor Morton, a prominent physician of Glasgow, and had five children. The children of Doctor and Elizabeth (Corsan) Morton were: Thomas Corsan Morton, a famous painter, who, several years before he died, was appointed "Keeper of the Galleries of Scotland"; Colonel Hugh Morton of Glasgow, Scotland, died 1928; David Morton; Bruce Morton; Robert Morton; Sarah Morton.

EBENEZER and JOHN CORSAN, sons of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, died young.

MARGARET CORSAN, the youngest daughter of Thomas and Agnes (Kennedy) Corsan, married George Donald, the proprietor of the Annandale Distillery of Annan, Scotland, where "Johnny Walker" is now made. They had ten children: Agnes

Donald, married David McKay; Barbara Bonner Donald, married John Jackson of "Solway Bank," Annan, Scotland; Margaret Donald, born Jan., 1833, living in 1933, married Peter Drummond of Thornhill, Dumfriesshire, Scotland; Ebenezer Donald, died young; Dr. Alexander Donald, died at 39 years of age, unmarried; William J. Donald, married Elizabeth Blythe of Coventry, England; George Donald, unmarried; Mary Anne Donald, married Captain Aitchison; Katherine Donald, married John S. Millar; Jennie Donald, married Walter Park of Annan, Scotland; Elizabeth Donald, married Matthew Blythe of Coventry, England.

AGNES DONALD, the eldest daughter of Margaret (Corsan) and George Donald, married David McKay of the Hurkledale, Scotland. They had eight children: David McKay, resides at Fort Wayne, Ind.; Margaret McKay, married B. Drummond of Moffat, Scotland; Mary McKay, married Rev. William Johnstone of Ormiston, Scotland; Agnes McKay, unmarried; George Mc-Kay, of Winnepeg, Canada; William McKay, bachelor; Jane McKay, married Doctor McCorkill of Farnham, Quebec Province, Canada.

MARY ANNE DONALD, the daughter of Margaret (Corsan) and George Donald, married Capt. Andrew Aitchison. They resided at Solway Bank, Annan, Scotland. They had seven children: Andrew Aitchison, Jr.; George Aitchison; David Aitchson; William Aitchison; Eva Aitchison; Ethel Aitchison; Margaret Aitchison. William and Margaret died young. Eva married William Wallace and resides at Viking, Sask., Canada. Ethel married Lieut. Com. Bertie Bluett, who went down with his ship, "H. M. S. Monmouth," sank by the Germans of Coronal during the World War.

KATHERINE DONALD, the daughter of Margaret (Corsan) and George Donald, married Maj. John Smith Millar of the Territorial Force. They lived at Apsley House, Annan, Scotland. They had two children: Col. W. J. Millar; Margaret Corsan Millar.

COL. W. J. MILLAR, of the K. O. S. B., the only son of Katherine (Donald) and Maj. John Smith Millar, won the D. S. O. in the World War. He married Margaret Tweedie of Dumfries, Scotland. They reside at Westerhill, Annan. They had four children: Thomas Tweedie Millar; John S. Millar, Jr.; Edith Ogilvie Millar; Andrew Blair Millar, who died during the World War, aged twelve years. Thomas Tweedie Millar, born about 1897, married Miss Violet Robinson. He was assistant engineer for Palestine under the British Government and in this capacity was in charge of the road building in that country. In July, 1932, his home was entered by Arab bandits, his wife was stabbed and murdered and he was seriously wounded. He was sent home to recover from his wounds, but died in Feb., 1933, as a result of a dagger stab that had penetrated his diaphragm. Commenting on his death, the press said that the wonderful roads of Palestine, built under his direction, will be a perpetual memorial to his engineering skill. John S. Millar, Jr., born about 1899, married Nancy Malcolm. He is a captain in the British army. Edith Ogilvie Millar married Col. Thorburn McGowan, D. S. O. of the British army.

MARGARET CORSAN MILLAR, the only daughter of Katherine (Donald) and Maj. John Smith Millar, married, first, William James Hutton, and second, L. E. Doty. Mr. and Mrs. Doty reside at Elyria, Ohio. Margaret Corsan (Millar) and her first husband, William James Hutton, had two daughters: Katherine D. Hutton, married Herbert George Cowling of East Angus, Quebec Province, Canada; Margaret Corsan Hutton, married Frederick Corbin Worthington of a very old Virginian family and a direct descendant of Capt. John Worthington of Baltimore, Md. Margaret Corsan (Millar) and her second husband, Mr. L. E. Doty, have one son: Edgar Forbes Doty, born 1907, and educated at Gary, Elyria High School and Cornell University. He is a mechanical engineer. Margaret Corsan (Millar) Doty is one of the genealogists of her family and furnished the data from which this sketch of the Dumfriesshire, Scotland, Corsansor Corsons has been compiled.

XXIII

THE CORSONS OF AMWELL TOWNSHIP, HUNTERDON COUNTY, NEW JERSEY

This group of Corson families is descended from Jacob Corson, who married Mary Hoppock prior to 1790. She was born in 1759 and died Oct. 7, 1828. She was buried on her daughter's-in-law father's plot (the Huffman plot) in Lebanon Old Dutch Reformed Cemetery. Her husband seems to have preceded her in death. His place of burial was not found. Mary Hoppock was the daughter of Peter and Catherine Hoppock and the granddaughter of Jost or George Hoppock and his wife, Mary, of Amwell Township, Hunterdon County, N. J. The Hoppock or Happack family were members of the early Dutch Reformed Church of Readington, Hunterdon County, and seem to have been of Dutch origin.

A thorough search of the records failed to reveal the identity of the parents of Jacob Corson. The place of residence of Jacob and Mary and their family was named in the will of her father as Amwell Township. Peter Hoppock seems to have been a large landowner, as he devised a farm of approximately 100 acres to each of his nine children. An abstract of part of this will follows:

"Give and devise unto Executors the farm on which my daughter, Mary Corson, now lives situated in Amwell—100 acres—part of the place given to me by my father. In Thrust never-the-less to permit my daughter, Mary Corson, to live on it if she herself shall choose so to do and receive and take rents, issues and profits to her own proper use without being in any manner subject to the debts, engagements or control of her Husband, or if she shall not choose to live on it, . . . the Executors to rent out same and pay rents to said daughter, Mary Corson, into her own hands and for which her own receit shall be sufficient etc. . . . After her decease I give the same unto her children to be equally divided between them."

The research work made in connection with this family by the compiler, working in conjunction with Miss Carola W. Bogardus of Hillside, Union County, N. J., who has worked unceasingly to identify the parents of her great great grandfather, Jacob, seemed to indicate that he belonged to Corson families identified with the early Dutch Reformed Church of Readington. Belonging to this Church were descendants of both the Sussex County and Staten Island Corson groups. A careful study of these families favored the possibility that Jacob, the husband of Mary Hoppock, was grandson of either Benjamin or Douwe Corson, sons of Jacob Corssen and Elizabeth Viele of Staten Island. Benjamin baptised a son, Jacob, in the Readington Church on Feb. 10, 1740, and Douwe baptised a son, Jacob, in the same church on May 1, 1743, and a son, Cornelius, on Feb. 8, 1740. Either of these sons of Benjamin or Douwe could have been the father of Jacob, the husband of Mary Hoppock. Possibly someone will be able to establish the line.

Jacob and Mary (Hoppock) Corson had four children. They were identified by quit claim deeds by which the land conveyed to Mary by her father, Peter Hoppock, was divided among the four children. The children were identified as follows:

Peter Corson; John Corson; Jacob Corson; Catherine Corson.

An abstract of the deed from John Corson and others to Peter Corson, dated Mar. 25, 1822, follows:

"Whereas Peter Hoppock, Senr. late of Amwell, deceased, by his last will and testament bearing date 16 Jan. 1806 did will and devise to his daughter, Mary Coarson, late Mary Hoppock, a certain plantation or tract of land situate in the township of Amwell, aforesaid and in this County of Hunterdon and State of New Jersey containing 98 and 3400 acres of land more or less, to her the said Mary Corson and whereas the said Mary Coarson now widow of Jacob Coarson Senr. late of Amwell aforesaid, deceased, hath four children to wit Peter Coarson, John Coarson, Jacob Coarson and Catherine Yawger late Catherine Coarson, heirs to the said Mary Coarson and lawful heirs to the said premises after her decease. Now this Indenture witnesseth that the said John Coarson and Esther his wife, Jacob Coarson and Ann his wife, and Catherine Yawger and William Yawger her husband for and in consideration of the sum of \$1.00 each of them in hand paid . . . released quit claim unto the aforesaid Peter Coarson parcel containing 24 and 27/100 acres." Other deeds give portions of this property to the other children of Mary Corson in much the same manner.

PETER CORSON AND HIS DESCENDANTS

PETER CORSON, probably the eldest son of Jacob and Mary (Hoppock) Corson, was born about 1790. He married Peggy Moore. A copy of his marriage record follows:

"August 25 in the year 1807 consent was given for the marriage of his son from witnesses present. Jacob Corson George Teepee Peter Corson and Peggy Moore Both of Amwell, he under age, a written

consent of his father, Jacob Corson, annexed. I do certify the above parties were married by me on the 5th day of Sept. A.D. 1807.

JOHN COVENHOVEN, Justice of the Peace."

Peter and Peggy Corson had four children:

Asa Corson, born Dec. 6, 1807; Mahlon Corson; Mary Ann Corson; Hannah L. Corson, born Jan. 6, 1825.

ASA CORSON, born Dec. 6, 1807, the eldest child of Peter and Peggy (Moore) Corson, married Dency Pond Nicholson. She was born at Salem, Pa. They resided at Scranton, Pa., and had seven children:

EMILY CORSON, born Jan. 23, 1834; NICHOLSON ASA CORSON, born Nov. 15, 1835; SYLVANUS HENRY CORSON, born Aug. 7, 1839; SYLVESTER MAHLON CORSON, born Jan. 30, 1841; ANN MARIE CORSON, born July 14, 1843, died young; DENCY MARGARET CORSON, born Aug. 23, 1850, died young; PETER WILSON CORSON, born Aug. 23, 1850.

Asa Corson died Apr. 29, 1892, at Scranton, Pa.

SYLVANUS HENRY CORSON, born Aug. 7, 1839, son of Asa and Dency Pond (Nicholson) Corson, was a veteran of the Civil War. He was severely wounded in action, but recovered and lived to be ninety-six years old. He died Mar. 31, 1933. He married Eleanore Gardner and had two sons:

ALBERT CORSON, living (1933) at Nutley, Essex County, N. J.;

GEORGE CORSON, now deceased but has descendants living in Pennsylvania.

SYLVESTER MAHLON CORSON, son of Asa and Dency Pond (Nicholson) Corson, was born Jan. 30, 1841. He married Sarah J. Jones. They lived at Scranton, Pa., and had two children:

LULU J. CORSON, married W. C. McDonnell;

HARRY G. CORSON, living in Scranton, Pa., in 1933.

PETER WILSON CORSON, son of Asa and Dency Pond (Nicholson) Corson, was born Aug. 22, 1850. He married, Apr. 5, 1873, at Corning, N. Y., Jennie S. Williams. She was born Feb., 1856, at Monroe, Wis., and died Jan. 31, 1919, at Los Angeles, Calif., where Mr. Corson now resides. They had five children:

EDGAR N. CORSON, died July 13, 1922;

Asa G. Corson, born Dec. 20, 1875, at Corning, N. Y., married, July 31, 1901, Lila Grace Field, born Sept. 24, 1877;

HENRY W. CORSON, married ______; JAMES R. CORSON, married ______; MABEL G. CORSON, married _____ Wharain.

Asa G. and Lila Grace (Field) Corson reside at Los Angeles and have two children:

LILA GRACE CORSON, born May 27, 1903; Asa Leroy Corson, born June 30, 1905, married Merna Chapman.

MAHLON CORSON, the son of Peter and Peggy (Moore) Corson, married Sarah Heath. They lived on a farm at Locktown, Hunterdon County, N. J. He died July 2, 1881, aged 71 years 5 months 23 days. She died July 18, 1895, aged 88 years 1 month 3 days. They had five children:

JOHN CORSON; DENCY CORSON, died in infancy; ASA CORSON; MARY CORSON, died July 5, 1862, unmarried; JANE CORSON, died Aug. 15, 1863, unmarried.

JOHN CORSON, the son of Mahlon and Sarah (Heath) Corson, married Esther A. Dalrymple. He died May 1, 1878, aged 29 years 8 months 29 days. She married, second, Asa Hockenbury and died at Stockton, N. J., Mar. 8, 1927, aged 78 years 11 months. John and Esther A. (Dalrymple) Corson had one son:

ASA CORSON, the son of Mahlon and Sarah (Heath) Corson, married Lydia A. Mecklin. They resided at Locktown, N. J. They had three children:

SARAH ANN CORSON, married Joseph Robbins, no issue;

JOHN HENRY CORSON, married Elizabeth Burket and had a son, Thomas Asa Corson, who married Adelaide Hills, no issue;

VIOLETTA R. CORSON, unmarried, resides (1933) at Locktown, N. J., with her mother, Lydia M. Corson, and sister, Sarah A. Robbins.

MARY ANN CORSON, the daughter of Peter and Peggy (Moore) Corson, married, Oct. 13, 1836, Adam Bellis of Belvedere, N. J. They had three children:

MARTIN BELLIS, died in infancy;

MARY BELLIS, died young;

MARGARET BELLIS, married John Simerson. They had children and lived at Belvedere, Warren County, N. J.

HANNAH L. CORSON, the daughter of Peter and Peggy (Moore) Corson, was born Jan. 6, 1825. She married, May 10, 1845, Edward Holcolm Dilts, who was born May 9, 1823. They

lived at Lambertville, Hunterdon County, N. J. She died June 9, 1919; he died Aug. 20, 1890. They were Baptists. They had three children:

OLIVER H. DILTS, born Dec. 16, 1847, died Feb. 7, 1871;

- EMILY FRANCES DILTS, born Apr. 13, 1846, died July 24, 1928, married, first, Lewis Riddle, second, George Hyde;
- GEORGE HOWARD DILTS, born Jan. 15, 1856. The latter married but the name of his wife was not learned. He had three children:

THE SECOND SON OF JACOB AND MARY (HOPPOCK) CORSON

JOHN CORSON, the son of Jacob and Mary (Hoppock) Corson, probably married, first, Mahitable Dalrymple, Nov. 14, 1812. This marriage is recorded in Hiram Deats' "Hunterdon County Marriages 1795 to 1870." John Corson's will was probated Mar. 27, 1848. His residence was given as Delaware (formerly Amwell Township), Hunterdon County, N. J. He named his wife as Hester, who probably was his second wife. He devised one-third of his property to his wife, Hester, and the remainder to his brothers, Peter and Jacob. Seemingly he was not survived by children.

JACOB CORSON, JR. AND HIS DESCENDANTS

JACOB CORSON, JR., the son of Jacob, Sr., and Mary (Hoppock) Corson, was born in Amwell Township, Hunterdon County, N. J., Feb. 5, 1801. He married, Dec. 16, 1818, Ann Huffman, born Jan. 16, 1800, the daughter of William and Sarah Huffman. They were married in the Dutch Reformed Church at Lebanon, N. J. Jacob Corson, Jr., was a tailor and at one time owned a tailoring establishment adjoining the old Dutch Reformed Church at Lebanon, Hunterdon County. Jacob, Jr., and Ann Corson had the following children:

WILLIAM H. CORSON, born Jan. 31, 1821; JOHN CORSON, born Dec. 25, 1824, died Nov. 27, 1895; MARY CORSON, born Feb. 5, 1828, died unmarried; WATSON CORSON, born Aug. 4, 1830, married Louise Kent, no issue;

THE NEW ENGLAND CORSON FAMILIES

Associated with the early history of New Hampshire and Maine are found a group of Corson families, whose histories the compiler was unable to identify with the other groups recorded in this work. After a careful research, there seemed to be little doubt that the New England families were not related to the Staten Island, Sussex County, N. J., or South Jersey groups. The descendants of these families were found scattered across the northern tier of states to the Pacific coast.

The first ancestor of the New England group appears from the records to be one Cornelius Corsen or Coson, who resided at Cochecho Point, N. H., as early as 1685. He is identified as the father of Samuel Corson, who was living in Dover, N. H., and in combat with the Indians in 1710. This identification is found in New HAMPSHIRE PROVINCIAL PAPERS, Vol. IX, p. 155, and in THE GENEALOGICAL DICTIONARY OF MAINE AND NEW HAMP-SHIRE, by Charles Thornton Libby, Part 2, p. 162. In a suit for the possession of land brought by Richard Waldron against so-called "Pretenders" to his claim (1719-29), Samuel Corson claimed land received from his father. In 1719, Hatevil Roberts, James Stagpole and Henry Hobbs deposed that William Henderson and Cornelius Corson were in quiet possession at Cochecho Point by building and improving 34 years ago (1685).

Samuel Corson seems to be the only child of Cornelius, whose identification is certain. Other children may have been Abigail and Hannah. Abigail Coursin or Coursonwhitt (both names appearing in the record) is recorded as being taken captive by the Indians before 1695. (Coleman's NEW ENGLAND CAPTIVES CARRIED TO CANADA, Vol. 1, Chap. IV, p. 92, and MATHEW CARY'S list of October 1695, p. 75). Hannah (Courson), Portsmouth, was a witness in 1702.

In the above named suit, twelve settlers were dispossessed because of Waldron's overlapping grant and Samuel Corson moved to Rochester, N. H.

A careful search of available records and correspondence with those interested in the genealogy of the family failed to disclose the identity of his ancestors or their origin. The possibility that

Cornelius may have been a descendant of John Cousins, who settled on Cousin's Island as early as 1627, seemed to be not at all unlikely, although positive proof was not found. This supposition was suggested because of the similarity of the name, Corson, and the various forms of the English surname, Cousin, which have been found in old documents spelled as Corzen, Curzon, Cozzen, Cosens, Cousens, Cossen, Cosin, etc. (See "Cousins Family," Redlon's Saco Valley Settlements and Families, pp. 590-91, and Pope's Pioneers of Maine and New Hampshire, p. 46.)

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An examination of records relating to John Cousins and his descendants disclosed many instances in which the name was spelled Cossin, Cosson, Cosen, or Cosin. In the will of Samuel Tebbets of Dover, N. H., dated Nov. 8, 1738, and proved Jan. 31, 1738-39, the name of his granddaughter was spelled in one instance as "Mary Cosin" and in another sentence as "Mary Corsen." She was mentioned in each case as one of the children of "my son, Samuel Tebbets, deceased." (Probate Records of the Province of New Hampshire, Vol. 2, 1718-40, pp. 735-36.) Although her identity was not clearly established, she probably was the wife of one of the sons of the aforesaid Samuel Corson of Dover, N. H.

SAMUEL CORSON is recorded as owning land at Rochester, N. H., in 1722, according to the following record found on page 34, History of Rochester, N. H., by Franklin McDuffee, A.M.: "1722—Samuel Corson was one of the Third Share Proprietors of Rochester, N. H." (A whole share was 500 acres.) On page 346, History of Dover, N. H., by A. H. Quint, D.D., again is mentioned: "1753—In a Deposition, he and others swear to 'having seen the letters on a pitch pine tree (a boundery) for upwards

of thirty years,' Sept. 19, 1753. Sam O Corson" mark

Samuel Corson of Dover, N. H., married Mary — and had at least seven children. The birth records of five are recorded in the Vital Statistics, Concord, N. H., and are given in Vol. 1, p. 23, Historical Collections of Dover, N. H., as follows:

Only fragments of the histories of the first Samuel's children were found and their lines were not definitely proved. It is re-Sarah corded in a history of Dover, N. H., that Zebulon Corson was in New the army in 1746. About 1769 it seems that Aaron, Samuel, include Moses, Lemuel and probably John Corson moved from Rochester, N. H., to Lebanon, Me. Although the proof of their line was 500.1 1 - 12 ter is a not found, they, without much doubt, were brothers and grandchildren of the first Samuel of Dover. Isaac Corson, probably another brother, moved to Waterville, Me. Aaron Corson moved from Rochester, N. H., and settled in Lebanon, Me., in 1769. His brother, Samuel, settled in Lebanon, Me., in 1770, clearing land and building a log cabin. He died in Lebanon in 1785. He had a son, Levi, and probably other children. In the 1790 census of Lebanon, York County, Me., are found the names of Levi, Daniel, Mary, and Aaron Corson. Levi's family, according to this census, seems to have consisted of himself, wife, one son over sixteen, two sons under sixteen, and a daughter. Daniel's family appears to have consisted of himself, wife, a son under sixteen years, and a daughter. Aaron's family included, seemingly, himself, three sons over sixteen years, and three females, one probably being his wife. Mary Corson is recorded as the only one in her family and probably lived alone.

MOSES CORSON was married May 15, 1769, by Parson Isaac Hasey of Lebanon, Me., to Elizabeth (Betsy) Perkins. On May 15, 1775, he enlisted in Capt. Philip Hubbard's Company, under Col. James Scammon's 30th Regiment, Mass., and was in service for 2 months and 22 days. His brother, John Corson, enlisted May 20, 1775, as private and died in service, July 27, 1775, his brother, Moses, later collected for bounty coat due John. (Vol. 4, Mass. Soldiers and Sailors, War of Rev.) Moses Corson sold his place in Lebanon in 1780 and moved to Shapleigh, Me., where he had a homestead of 205 acres valued at \$10 per acre. He died prior to Feb. 21, 1803, on which date the administration of his estate was granted to his widow, Elizabeth, and to Isaac Corson

of Waterville, Me. Andrew Lord and James Corson furnished the administrator's bond for \$4,000. Andrew Lord was a son-inlaw of the deceased.

Moses Corson was listed in the 1790 census at Shapleigh, Me., as having a family of seven males under sixteen years of age and three females, including his wife. Moses and Elizabeth Corson had the following children:

Moses Corson, Jr., died in June, 1816, and his widow requested that Andrew Lord, the husband of his sister, Priscilla, administer her deceased husband's estate. Roxanna (Carpenter) Corson married, second, Levi Bean of Hartland, Somerset County, Me., and in 1833 they gave quitclaim deeds for her share of her first husband's estate to Alanson Corson of Caanan, Me.

7. PRISCILLA CORSON, daughter of Moses, Sr., and Elizabeth Corson, was born in 1778, at Lebanon, Me., and died June 28, 1820. She married, Apr. 3, 1797, Andrew Lord, the son of Noah and Keziah (Brackett) Lord. He was born Nov. 14, 1775, at Lebanon, Me., and died at Acton, Me., May 11, 1850. Of their children:

KESIA LORD, born Mar. 3, 1810, at Shapleigh, Me., married Jonathan Hubbard. He was born July 30, 1803, at Shapleigh, Me., and died Mar. 10, 1881, at Acton, Me., which, until 1830, was part of Shapleigh. Jonathan and Kesia (Lord) Hubbard had a son: AUGUSTUS HUBBARD, born at Acton, Me., June 27, 1849, died June 20, 1920, at Gloucester, Mass. He married Judith E. Wonson, who was born Aug. 12, 1849, at Gloucester, Mass., and died at the same place, Nov. 2, 1914. They had a daughter:

She is one of the family genealogists and furnished information she had gathered about the New England Corson families.

ISAAC CORSON, probably a grandson of Samuel and Mary Corson of Dover, N. H., married, first, Cynthia Nason. In the 1790 census he is recorded as residing at Shapleigh, Me., and his family consisted of himself, one son under sixteen years, and one female, probably his wife. He seems to have moved to Waterville, Me., as his residence was so named when he was appointed as one of the administrators of the estate of Moses Corson on Feb. 21, 1803. He probably was a brother of the deceased Moses. Isaac and Cynthia (Nason) Corson had the following children:

THE CANADIAN CORSON FAMILY

In 1928, while at the Toronto National Exhibition, I talked to Mr. Rolph R. Corson, who had an exhibit of perfumes and toilet requisites in the Manufacturers' Building. He told me that he belonged to the New Jersey branch of the Corsons and inquired: "From which branch of the family are you descended?" I could not tell him and feeling embarrassed because I knew so little about my ancestors, decided to investigate as soon as I arrived home. It was this conversation with Rolph R. Corson that started the investigations concerning the histories of the Corson families that were to be continued until this work was compiled.

During the research incidental to compiling this work, I came into contact with some of the descendants of the Canadian Corson family to which Rolph belonged, but was never able to identify the parents of their ancestor, Daniel Corson. He, according to records in possession of their family, married Rebecca Lawrasson and moved from Sussex County, N. J., to what is now Clinton County, Ontario, with the Lawrasson family and other New Jersey families, to take up liberal land grants offered by the Canadian Government of that time. It was a sincere disappointment not to be able to identify this family with one of the groups, whose histories to their progenitors have been traced and recorded.

According to a brief one-page sketch of the family, said to have been written as a memorandum by Henry Ryan Corson, their ancestor, Daniel, was the son of Benjamin, the first, of the Staten Island Corsons, who moved from Staten Island to Bucks County, Pa., in 1726. Because of the complete history of Benjamin, the first, and his descendants, we know that the Daniel who moved to Canada was not of Benjamin's line. Although the identity of Daniel's parents was not found, the circumstantial evidence, in the opinion of the compiler, indicated that he belonged to the Sussex County group, descended from Jan Corszen, who came to New Amsterdam from the Dutch settlement in Recife, Brazil.

This circumstantial evidence may be outlined as follows: Mr. Rolph R. Corson has in his possession a book entitled "Father Corson," and is the history of the life and religious labors of Rev. Robert Corson, who was the second son of Daniel Corson and

Rebecca Lawrasson. This book contains extracts from letters written by the Rev. Robert Corson and by his eldest son, John W. Corson, from which it is clear that those two persons believed that Daniel Corson was born in Sussex County, N. J., twelve years before the Revolutionary War; that he married Rebecca Lawrasson and moved with the Lawrasson family and other New Jersey families to what is now Clinton County, Ontario. That the foregoing was correct, there would seem to be little doubt.

From the history of the Sussex County Corsons in volume one we know that the families living in Sussex County, N. J., from about 1763 were descended from Johannes or John Corssen of the Sussex County group. Also that no evidence was found that Corsons of other groups lived in this county at this time. Also that there was a movement of Sussex County families to Canada about the time of the Revolutionary War. The following is quoted from page 195 of The Gustine Compendium by Gustine Coursen Weaver:

"Eliphalet Gustine settled prior to 1763 in Sussex Co. About the year, 1777, during the Revolutionary War, Eliphalet and his wife (nee Whitman), in company with some other persons, started overland from Sussex Co., N. J., for Canada with a view to locating there."

Also in the same volume it is indicated that Gustine and Corson families of Sussex County were associated not only in this county, but in immigrations to other parts of our country.

Although there seems to be much circumstantial evidence indicating that Daniel Corson, who moved to Canada, belonged to the Corson families of the Sussex County group, a careful search of the records failed to identify his parentage. Whether he was descended from the children of Johannes Corssen and Geertruyde Van Tuyle or from Jacob Coursen of Roxbury or Rocksbury Township, Morris County, N. J., who died prior to Sept. 14, 1770, and who, although unidentified in this work, was undoubtedly of the Sussex County group, remains unsolved.

DANIEL CORSON and Rebecca Lawrasson had six children:

Robert and Emma (Freeland) Corson had eight children. They were:

He lived at Markham, where he continued the operation of the weekly newspaper started by his father. Robert John Corson was the father of Rolph R. Corson of Toronto, Ontario.

DR. ADAM CLARK CORSON, born Jan. 20, 1839, at Dumfries, Ontario, Canada, was the youngest son of Rev. Robert and Emma (Freeland) Corson. He married Henrietta Hequembury Cone, who was born Feb. 14, 1842, at Hartford, Conn., and died June 18, 1896, at Philadelphia, Pa. He died Oct. 6, 1873, at Flushing, N. Y. Of their children, William Russell Cone Corson was born Feb. 18, 1870, at New York, N. Y. He married, June 25, 1891, at Brooklyn, N. Y., Marion Fay Lyles, who was born Aug. 13, 1871, at Flatbush, N. Y. They have two daughters:
